STATE OF MAINE.

RESOLVE in favor of the Maine Institution for the Blind.

Resolved: That the sum of twenty thousand dollars be 2 and hereby is appropriated to the Maine Institution for 3 the Blind for the year nineteen hundred and seven, and a 4 like sum for the year nineteen hundred and eight, to be 5 expended by the officers of said institution in the main-6 tenance thereof and in providing suitable buildings, tools, 7 apparatus and instructors for the beneficiaries thereof, and 8 particularly to be expended by said officers under such rules 9 and regulations as they may prescribe for the purpose of 10 giving to every blind or partially blind person over eighteen 11 years of age, who is a resident of the State, practical instruc-12 tion for a period not exceeding three years, in some useful 13 occupation conducive to his or her self-support.

The officers of said institution in furtherance of the pur-15 poses of this resolve, may provide or pay for temporary 16 lodgings and temporary support for workmen or pupils 17 received at any industrial school or workshop established 18 by them, and may ameliorate the condition of the blind by 19 devising means to facilitate the circulation of books, by 20 promoting visits among the aged or helpless blind in their 21 homes, and by such other methods as they may deem expe-22 dient; provided, that they shall not undertake the permanent 23 support or maintenance of any blind person at the expense 24 of the State.

STATEMENT OF FACTS.

The Maine Institution for the Blind was incorporated under the general laws of Maine, June 23, 1905.

There are twenty-five directors, a president, two vice presidents, a clerk and a treasurer. The president is Morrill N. Drew, vice presidents, F. E. Boothby and Charles H. Randall, clerk, J. C. Knapp, and treasurer, Harry Butler.

This institution is to be located in the city of Portland. It is proposed to accommodate between twenty-five and fifty. It is proposed to teach broom-making, chair-seating and mattressmaking, to be followed by other trades. The outside work will consist of teaching the blind the methods of writing, which blind learn, also reading, to enable them, if possible, to do work in their own homes.
