STATE OF MAINE.

RESOLVE, in favor of Daniel Lineo.

Resolved: That there be paid to Daniel Lineo of Warren
2 a pension of five dollars per month, commencing the first
3 day of January nineteen hundred and nine, and to continue
4 during the pleasure of the Legislature.

STATEMENT OF FACTS.

Daniel Lineo was a slave until his enlistment in Co. E, 81st Regt. U. S. C. at New Orleans, May 27, 1863. He was discharged Sept. 1, 1866, by reason of expiration of service. He is pensioned under the 1907 age law at \$15.00 per month. After the war he came North, married, and settled in the town of Warren. He proved to be a hard working man, of good character, respected by all who knew him—in short, a good citizen, as he was a good soldier. In June 1907 he was stricken with paralysis on his right side, and since then has been entirely helpless and dependent and has had to be helped by the town, the G. A. R. Post and individual friends. His house is mortgaged for \$350.
