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## STATE OF MAINE.

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RESOLVE, in favor of Mrs. Rebecca W. Carroll, widow—  
formerly widow of Enoch Lurvey, Jr., late First Sergeant,  
Company H, Fourth Regiment of Infantry Maine Volun-  
teers, with subsequent service in the U. S. Navy, who was  
lost at sea December 24, 1867.

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*Resolved:* That there be paid out of the State Treasury  
2 to Mrs. Rebecca W. Carroll of South West Harbor in the  
3 County of Hancock in the State of Maine, a State pension  
4 of six dollars per month from January first, nineteen hun-  
5 dred and nine, until such time as she shall receive a United  
6 States pension, or until she shall again marry.



## STATEMENT OF FACTS.

Mr. Lurvey after returning from the War entered upon his occupation which he had laid aside when he entered the service in October, 1861, that of a sea-faring man. He was lost at sea on December 24, 1867, (washed overboard by the sea while taking in sail). Mr. Lurvey married Miss Rebecca W. Whitmore of Tremont, Maine, March 13, 1864, while at home on furlough, granted by reason of re-enlistment in the field as a veteran volunteer for three additional years of service. Two children were born to them, viz:

George Lindsey Lurvey, born December 14, 1866.

Enoch Edwin Lurvey, born January 25, 1868.

George Lindsey Lurvey died in infancy.

Mrs. Lurvey re-married December 6, 1870. Her second husband was Jacob W. Carroll of Tremont, Maine, a sea-faring man. Nine children were born to them, seven daughters and two sons, the oldest is now 37 years of age and the youngest is 21 years. Captain Carroll died December 13, 1899, leaving nothing but a home, consisting of small buildings, old, and the land poor, hardly sufficient to support the cow they kept, worth approximately about \$500.00. She is wholly dependent upon her children for her maintenance. By reason of the good and faithful service rendered by her first husband, he having been wounded in the shoulder and a prisoner at Libby Prison, she believes that she is entitled to a pension, and prays that the same may be granted.
