STATE OF MAINE.

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND NINE.

AN ACT in favor of the law student who is also a laboring man.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1. Any laboring man or person who desires to 2 study for the profession of law shall not be denied the 3 privilege of any examination before the Maine State Board 4 of Bar Examiners by reason of his occupation.

Sect. 2. Any citizen of Maine of good moral character, 2 who has reached the age of twenty-one years, and who has 3 graduated from any high school and can show a certificate 4 of study from any qualified attorney and counsellor at law, 5 setting forth his qualifications, the term not being required 6 to be in excess of six months' study of the principles of law

7 under the guidance of said attorney, shall be eligible for8 examination.

Sect. 3. Any student who has carefully pursued the study 2 of law for a term of two years in any law school or in any 3 law office under the direction of any qualified professor of 4 law or any lawyer, and that student fails to pass the re-5 quired examination, may have the right to review all papers 6 which contain the questions and the answers given either 7 by himself or of any other person who has been admitted 8 to the bar at the same sitting of the said State Board of 9 Bar Examiners.

Sect. 4. Any student who has been refused admission to 2 the bar on account of his moral character shall have a right 3 to vindicate his character in open court; and all members 4 of the board of examiners shall be required to attend said 5 hearing and shall be required to set forth the objection to 6 said student.

Sect. 5. Any laboring man who desires to become a law 2 student may file his intentions with the clerk of the Supreme 3 Court in the county where he resides, and shall be allowed 4 at least three months' time during each year of study to 5 pursue any form of labor which to him seems proper and 6 right.

Sect. 6. Any person who has taken a full three years' 2 course in the study of law in the State University and 3 having received therefrom a diploma and a degree of Bach4 elor of Laws may practice law before all the courts of Maine5 without further examination, unless said person is of im-6 moral character.
