IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND NINE.

AN ACT to amend Chapter 93, Section 46 of the Revised Statutes relating to liens on logs and lumber.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1. Section 46 of Chapter 93 of the Revised Stat-

- 2 utes of Maine are amended as follows: By inserting before
- 3 the word "such" in the eighth line thereof the following:
- 4 'Whoever by himself, his servants or agents, hauls logs or
- 5 lumber by teams or any machine has a lien on the logs and
- 6 lumber for the amount due for such hauling,' so that said
- 7 section as amended shall read as follows:

'Sect. 46. Whoever labors at cutting, hauling, rafting or 9 driving logs or lumber or at cooking for persons engaged 10 in such labor, or in shoeing horses or oxen or repairing

property while thus employed has a lien on the logs and lumber for the amount due for his personal services and the services performed by his team, which takes precedence of all other claim except liens reserved to the State; whose ever both shares and runs logs by himself, his servants or agents has a lien thereon for the price of such shoring and running; whoever by himself, his servants or agents hauls logs or lumber by teams or any machine has a lien on the logs and lumber for the amount due for such hauling; such liens continue for sixty days after the logs or lumber arrive at the place of destination for sale or manufacture and may be enforced by attachment.
