STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE
HUNDRED AND ELEVEN.

AN ACT to prevent putting of sawdust and other refuse in the
waters of Pleasant River.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1. No person shall put, or allow the same to be
2 done by any person in his employ, into Pleasant River in the
3 towns of Columbia Falls and Addison in the County of
4 Washington, and any mill waste, slabs, edgings, sawdust or
5 any other mill waste of a fibrous nature, created in the man-
6 ufacture of any sawed or planed lumber, or shall place or
7 deposit the same on the banks of said river in such negligent
8 or careless manner that the same shall fall or be washed into

9 said river, or with the intent that the same shall be washed
10 into said river.

Whoever shall violate any of the provisions of this Section
12 shall be subject to a penalty of not less than fifty dollars, nor
13 more than one hundred dollars and cost of prosecution for
14 each offense.

Sect. 2. In all prosecutions arising under this act, municipi-
2 pal and police courts and trial justices, within their respective
3 counties, shall have upon complaint, original and concurrent
4 jurisdiction with the supreme and superior courts and all
5 fines, forfeitures and penalties received for violation of this
6 act shall be paid forthwith by the person receiving the same
7 to the State Treasurer and credited to fines and license fees
8 for the protection of birds and game.
