STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE
HUNDRED AND ELEVEN.

AN ACT to regulate fishing in Crosbyville stream, so-called,
in the towns of Avon, Phillips, Freeman and Strong, in the
county of Franklin.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1. For a period of five years from July 15th, A.
2 D., 1911, it shall be unlawful to fish for, take, catch or kill
3 any kind of fish at any time in Crosbyville stream, so-
4 called, situated in the towns of Avon, Phillips, Freeman
5 and Strong, in the County of Franklin. It shall also be
6 unlawful for any person to have in possession at any time
7 any kind of fish taken in violation of any provision of this
8 Section.

Sect. 2. Whoever violates any provision of this act shall
2 be subject to the same penalty as is provided in the general

3 law of the state for the illegal fishing for, or taking, catch-
4 ing, killing or having in possession of trout or land-locked
5 salmon.

Sect. 3. In all prosecutions arising under this act, municipi-
2 pal and police courts and trial justices, within their respec-
3 tive counties, shall have, upon complaint, original and con-
4 current jurisdiction with the supreme judicial and superior
5 courts, and all fines, penalties, and forfeitures received by
6 any person for any violation of this act shall be paid forth-
7 with by the person receiving the same to the state treasurer.
