### STATE OF MAINE

#### IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND ELEVEN.

AN ACT for the protection of life on buildings.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows: Section 1. All materials used in building so-called scaf-2 fold or scaffolds to be of the best spruce; such scaffold 3 or scaffolds to be erected by a hodcarrier or bricklayer with 4 no less than five years experience; such scaffold or scaf-5 folds not to be used until properly nailed and stayed with 6 ten-penny cut nails; said scaffold to have sufficient lad-7 ders and runways as may be deemed advisable by the super-8 intendent or foreman of said job, and said scaffold to be 9 thoroughly examined by the foreman and report the same 10 as being fit. All scaffolds over one story high not to be

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11 less than fifty-four inches wide, so as to have sufficient 12 space for men to pass each other. All scaffolds over one 13 story high to have a guard of four feet and one-half so as 14 to prevent men tripping and tumbling off, also said scaf-15 folds to have a backboard so as to prevent brick falling 16 off.

Sect. 2. All floors in said buildings over one story high, 2 to be covered by plank or boards sufficient to prevent men 3 falling through or brick or other material falling on the 4 men working below.

Sect. 3. All elevators for the purpose of hoisting brick 2 or mortar to have an experienced man to give the signals 3 to the engineer operating said elevators, and thereby lessen 4 the number of deaths and accidents which have happened 5 in years gone by. Said man or men to be a member of the 6 Building Trades.

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
