STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND ELEVEN.

AN ACT to amend Section twenty-five of Chapter one hundred and twenty-five of the Revised Statutes relating to the observance of the Lord's Day.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:
Section 1. Section twenty-five of Chapter one hundred
2 and twenty-five of the Revised Statutes is hereby amended
3 by adding thereto the following: "The provisions of this
4 section shall not be held to prohibit the manufacture and
5 distribution of steam, gas or electricity for illuminating pur6 poses, heat or motive power, nor the distribution of water
7 for fire or domestic purposes, nor the use of the telegraph
8 or the telephone, nor the retail sale of drugs and medicines,

9 nor articles ordered in the prescription of a physician or me-10 chanical appliances used by physicians or surgeons, nor the 11 retail sale of tobacco in any of its forms by licensed innhold-12 ers, common victuallers, druggists and newsdealers whose 13 stores are open for the sale of newspapers every day in the 14 week, nor the retail sale of ice cream, soda water and con-15 fectionery, by licensed innholders, and druggists, and by 16 such licensed common victuallers as are authorized to keep 17 open their places of business on the Lord's day, nor the let-18 ting of horses and carriages or of yachts and boats, nor the 19 running of steam ferry boats on established routes, nor the 20 running of street railway cars, nor the preparation, printing 21 and publication of newspapers, nor the sale and delivery of 22 newspapers, nor the wholesale or retail sale and delivery of 23 milk, nor the transportation of milk, nor the making of but-24 ter and cheese, nor the keeping open of public bath houses, 25 nor the making or selling by bakers or their employees, be-26 fore ten o'clock in the morning and between the hours of 27 four o'clock and half past six o'clock in the evening, of bread 28 or other food usually dealt in by them, nor the carrying on 29 of the business of bootblacks before cleven o'clock in the 30 forenoon,' so that said section as amended shall read as 31 follows:

Sect. 25. Whoever, on the Lord's Day, keeps open his 33 shop, workhouse, warehouse or place of business, travels, or 34 does any work, labor or business on that day, except works 35 of necessity or charity; uses any sport game or recreation; 36 or is present at any dancing, public diversion, show or en-37 tertainment, encouraging the same, shall be punished by fine 38 not exceeding ten dollars. The provisions of this section 39 shall not be held to prohibit the manufacture and distribu-40 tion of steam, gas or electricity for illuminating purposes, 41 heat or motive power, nor the distribution of water for fire 42 or domestic purposes, nor the use of the telegraph or the 43 telephone, nor the retail sale of drugs and medicines, nor 44 articles ordered by the prescription of a physician or me-45 chanical appliances used by physicians or surgeons, nor the 46 retail sale of tobacco in any of its forms by licensed innhold-47 ers, common victuallers, druggists and newsdealers whose 48 stores are open for the sale of newspapers every day in the 49 week, nor the retail sale of ice cream, soda water and con-50 fectionery, by licensed innholders, and druggists, and by 51 such licensed common victuallers as are authorized to keep 52 open their places of business on the Lord's Day, nor the let-53 ting of horses and carriages or of yachts and boats, nor the 54 running of steam ferry boats on established routes, nor the 55 running of street railway cars, nor the preparation, print-56 ing and publication of newspapers, nor the sale and delivery 57 of newspapers, nor the wholesale or retail sale and delivery 58 of milk, nor the transportation of milk, nor the making of 59 butter and cheese, nor the keeping open of public bath 60 houses, nor the making or selling by bakers or their em-61 ployees, before ten o'clock in the morning and between the 62 hours of four o'clock and half past six o'clock in the evening. 63 of bread or other food usually dealt in by them, nor the car-64 rying on of the business of bootblacks before eleven o'clock65 in the forenoon.'
