STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE
HUNDRED AND ELEVEN.

AN ACT to prohibit the throwing of sawdust and other mill waste into the South Branch of the Piscataquis River, in the town of Kingsbury, and in the tributaries to said South Branch of Piscataquis River in said town of Kingsbury, and in Thorn Brook, so called, and its tributaries, in the towns of Abbot, Kingsbury and Blanchard, in the county of Piscataquis.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1. No person shall put, or allow the same to be
2 done by any person within his employ, into the south branch
3 of the Piscataquis river, in the town of Kingsbury, or in
4 any of the tributaries to said south branch of Piscataquis
5 river in said town of Kingsbury, or in Thorn brook, so

6 called, or in any of the tributaries to said Thorn brook, in
7 the towns of Abbot, Kingsbury and Blanchard, in the county
8 of Piscataquis, any mill waste, slabs, edgings, sawdust, or
9 any other mill waste of a fibrous nature created in the man-
10 ufacture of sawed or planed lumber, or to place or deposit
11 the same on the bank of any of the above named waters
12 in such negligent or careless manner that the same shall fall
13 or be washed into any of said waters, or with the intent that
14 the same shall fall or be washed into any of said waters.

Sect. 2. Whoever violates any provision of this act shall
2 be subject to a penalty of not less than fifty dollars nor
3 more than one hundred dollars and costs of prosecution for
4 each offense.
