STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE
HUNDRED AND ELEVEN.

AN ACT to regulate the number of ruffed grouse (commonly called partridge) and woodcock which may be taken or had in possession by one person in any one day during open season.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1. No person shall, in any one day, take, catch, kill or have in possession more than five ruffed grouse (commonly called partridge) nor more than ten woodcock during open season on said birds.

Sect. 2. Whoever violates any provision of this act shall be subject to a penalty of not less than five dollars nor more than ten dollars and costs for each bird killed or had in possession in violation of any provision of this act.

Sect. 3. All act or parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed.
