STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND ELEVEN.

AN ACT to legalize game farming and fish farming in the State of Maine.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1. The Commissioners of Inland Fisheries and

Game may issue permits to any person, association or cor
poration, to establish, maintain or own a private fenced

game park or a fish farm, under such regulations as the

Commissioners of Inland Fisheries and Game may pre
scribe, on premises owned or controlled by him or it respec
tively, provided, however, that nothing herein contained

shall authorize any person, association or corporation to
fence in or enclose any great pond so as to exclude the pub
lo lic therefrom. And to that end said person, association or

corporation may employ means to preserve and propagate 12 all protected fish, game and fur bearing animals and birds 13 of the state, and it shall be a misdemeanor to trespass 14 thereon.

Such owner or owners of private parks or fish farms, their 16 agent or agents, may barter, sell or transport, in any num17 ber or quantity, any aforementioned game or fur bearing 18 animals, birds, or fish raised or grown in such parks or 19 farms at any time, alive or dead.

Provided, first: Said owners shall pay a yearly license fee of \$10 to the State Treasurer for the benefit of the State. Second: Said owners shall file with the Commissioners of Inland Fisheries and Game a description of the premises on which the applicant will keep such animals, birds or fish, and on the first day of December of each year shall make a report to said commissioners, giving the number of animals, birds or fish on hand, the number born, purchased, lost and sold during the year, and other general information. Third: Shipment of animals, birds or fish, alive or dead, shall be made only when accompanied by a special tag to be furnished by the Commissioners of Inland Fisheries and Game.
