STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE
HUNDRED AND ELEVEN.

AN ACT to amend Section four, Chapter one hundred and
two of the Public Laws of nineteen hundred and five, relating
to the Penobscot Tribe of Indians.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1. Section four of chapter one hundred and two
2 of the Public Laws of nineteen hundred and five is hereby
3 amended by adding after the word "services" in the last
4 line of said section, the words 'but the compensation of the
5 superintendent of schools of the city of Old Town for said
6 services shall be not less than fifty dollars per year,' so that
7 said section as amended shall read as follows:

'Sect. 4. All money appropriated for schools for the
9 Penobscot tribe of Indians shall be expended under the

10 supervision of the agent of said tribe, subject to the ap-
11 proval of the governor and council, said agent shall employ
12 the teachers and fix their salaries, limited by such appropri-
13 ation. The schools upon island number one, commonly
14 called Indian Old Town island, shall be under the care and
15 supervision of the superintendent of schools of the city of
16 Old Town; and those within the territorial limits of any
17 other town, under the care and supervision of the superin-
18 tending school committee of such town. Said superintend-
19 ent of school committee shall visit such schools at least three
20 times during each school term; regulate the grades and
21 courses of study; assist the teachers and scholars by coun-
22 sel; determine when any scholar of said tribe may properly
23 be admitted or transferred to the public schools of said city
24 or town; and make report to the agent once each year, not-
25 ing therein such facts and information as may seem of im-
26 portance in the interest of education among said tribe, or
27 as may be required by the governor and council. The agent
28 shall pay said superintendent of school committee from said
29 school appropriation a reasonable compensation for ser-
30 vices; but the compensation of the superintendent of schools
31 of the city of Old Town for said services shall be not less
32 than fifty dollars per year.'
