For the full support of all State charges for the year 1911. Said sum to be expended under the directions of the Trus-7 tees of Insane Hospitals.



STATEMENT OF FACTS.

Laws 1907, Chapter 100.

For maintenance and support of insane state beneficiaries, including salaries of officers and employees, supplies, fuel, lights, power, water, medical supplies and attendance, furnishings and maintenance of same, repairs to buildings and grounds, labor and material, maintenance of farm, garden, stable, hog department, greenhouse, laundry, quarry, general administration expenses, books, blank forms, printing and binding reports of trustees and officers, ordinary renovation of and additions to buildings, maintenance and improvement of grounds, roads and sidewalks, support and maintenance of criminal insane, and all expenses necessary and incident to the maintenance of the hospital at Chase Island, including supply of pure water, transportation of patients, officers and employees, and all expenses necessary and incidental to the proper and efficient conduct and management of all the affairs of the institution, etc.....
