AN ACT to repeal so much of Sections 1 and 2 of Chapter  
157 of the Public Laws of 1907 as requires and authorizes  
the holding of the term of the Supreme Judicial Court at  
Dover in the County of Piscataquis on the first Tuesday of  
May in each year.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

Section 1. That so much of Sections 1 and 2 of Chapter  
2 157 of the Public Laws of 1907 as requires and authorizes  
3 the holding of the term of the Supreme Judicial Court at  
4 Dover in the county of Piscataquis on the first Tuesday of  
5 May each year, is hereby repealed.
