STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE
HUNDRED AND THIRTEEN.

AN ACT to amend section one of chapter one hundred and
twenty-five of the Public Laws of nineteen hundred and nine
relating to the State superintendent of public schools.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1. Section one of chapter one hundred and twen-
2 ty-five of the Public Laws of nineteen hundred and nine
3 is hereby amended by striking out the words "twenty-five
4 hundred" in the second line thereof and the words "other
5 clerical assistance at a cost not to exceed one thousand dol-
6 lars annually" in the eighth, ninth and tenth lines thereof
7 and substituting in place thereof the words 'four thousand'
8 and 'such other clerical assistance as the Governor and

9 Council may deem necessary,' so that said section when
10 amended shall read as follows:

'Section 1. The salary of the state superintendent of
12 schools is hereby established at four thousand dollars per
13 annum. He shall receive in addition his actual cash ex-
14 penses incurred in the performance of his official duties
15 which sum shall be paid out of the specific appropriation for
16 that purpose. He shall employ a clerk, who may serve as
17 his deputy, at a salary not to exceed fifteen hundred dol-
18 lars annually, with necessary expenses when on official busi-
19 ness within the state, and such other clerical assistance as
20 the Governor and Council may deem necessary. He shall
21 perform his official duties at the office provided for him at
22 the seat of government and not elsewhere, not meaning,
23 however, to prohibit him from making such necessary jour-
24 neys and performing such duties as are necessary or inci-
25 dental to the immediate object of such journey.'
