STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE
HUNDRED AND THIRTEEN.

AN ACT authorizing the city of Westbrook to assume control
of Saccarappa Cemetery.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows :

Secton 1. The City of Westbrook, a municipal corpora-
2 tion created and existing by law and located in the County
3 of Cumberland, is hereby authorized to assume control, care,
4 and management of all land now included within the bound-
5 aries of what is known as the Saccarappa Cemetery, located
6 within the limits of said City of Westbrook.

Sect. 2. This act shall in no way disturb the title to any
2 land within the bounds of said cemetery, except that no
3 owner shall dispose of any land therein to be used for any

4 purpose other than a burial lot, but the City Council may
5 establish such ordinances and regulations, not inconsistent
6 with the constitution and the laws of this State, as shall be
7 needful to the proper use and care of said cemetery; and
8 impose fines and penalties for a breach thereof, not exceed-
9 ing twenty dollars (\$20.00) for any one offence, which may
10 be recovered to the use of said city, by an action of debt, or
11 on complaint before the Municipal Court of said city.

Sect. 3. The direct control and management of said ceme-
2 tery is hereby vested in the City Council, but the City Coun-
3 cil may exercise this power through the Board of Trus-
4 tees of Woodlawn Cemetery, which Board shall have no
5 power or authority in the matter, other than granted it by
6 said City Council.
