STATE OF MAINE

RESOLVE providing for the screening of Shiloh Pond in Franklin County.

Resolved, That the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars

- 2 be and is hereby appropriated for the year nineteen hun-
- 3 dred and thirteen for the purpose of screening Shiloh pond,
- 4 in Kingfield, in Franklin county, to be expended under the
- 5 direction of the commissioners of inland fisheries and game,
- 6 when the balance necessary to erect said screen, as found
- 7 by said commissioners, shall have been raised by the citizens
- 8 of Franklin county, and paid to the treasurer of state for
- 9 this purpose.

Provided, further, that this appropriation shall not be avail-11 able until the town of Kingfield shall have, in legal town 12 meeting, and having an article in the warrant for said town 13 meeting for that purpose, by vote of record, voted to as-14 sume all liability for the keeping of said screen in repair 15 and at all times free from sticks, leaves and all debris, so 16 that the same will not become clogged and prevent the free 17 running of the water through the same.

STATEMENT OF FACTS.

Shiloh Pond in Franklin County has been for several years stocked with trout and salmon from the State hatcheries. The outlet of the pond is not screened and flows about a mile into the Carrabassett River. Many of the fish placed in this pond escape through the outlet into Carrabassett River and very little benefit is derived from stocking this pond without being screened.
