STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND THIRTEEN.

AN ACT amending Section 7 of Chapter 15 of the Public Laws of 1907 defining the limits within which the municipality shall destroy dangerous insects.

Bc it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1. Section 7 of chapter 15 of the Public Laws
2 of 1907 as amended by chapter 34 of the Public Laws of
3 1909 and chapter 84 of the Public Laws of 1911, is hereby
4 further amended by striking out the fourth sentence and
5 substituting in place thereof the following: 'Said limit to
6 extend to and include all trees whose branches overhang the
7 highway;' so that said section as amended shall read as
8 follows:

'Should any person in the state suspect the presence of the to brown-tail moth or San Jose scale preying upon trees, shrubs It or vines in his possession or within his knowledge he shall 12 forthwith notify the commissioner of agriculture to that 13 effect; and it shall be the duty of said commissioner to cause 14 the said trees, shrubs or vines to be inspected. If sufficient 15 cause be found the commissioner of agriculture shall forth-16 with notify the municipal officers of the city or town where 17 such pests have been found. Municipal officers thus noti-18 fied shall immediately cause to be destroyed such of the 19 above named insects in their different stages as may be 20 found within the limits of the public streets and parks. 21 Said limit to extend to and include all trees whose branches 22 overhang the highway. Should such municipal officers neg-23 lect or fail within a reasonable time to perform the duties 24 herein imposed upon them, then the commissioner of agri-25 culture shall order such city, town or plantation to proceed 26 to destroy the above named insects in accordance with meth-27 ods to be prescribed by him and to spend such an amount 28 in the above named work as he shall deem necessary.

If any city, town or plantation shall fail to comply with the 30 directions of said commissioner in the performance of said 31 work and the expenditure of such money within the time 32 specified by him, then the commissioner of agriculture shall 33 cause the said work to be done and shall charge the actual 34 expense of the same to said city or town; such amount to

35 be collected as a state tax and credited to this appropria-36 tion.

Whenever a city, town or plantation is notified by the com38 missioner of agriculture of the presence of the brown-tail
39 moth or San Jose scale, the mayor of each city, the select40 men of each town and the assessors of each plantation shall
41 notify each owner of real estate located therein, requiring
42 him to destroy the above named insects in his orchard and
43 shade trees within a specified time. If the owner fails to
44 destroy the above named insects before the specified time,
45 then the city, town or plantation subject to the approval of
46 the commissioner of agriculture, shall destroy them, and
47 shall assess upon such aforesaid real estate the actual cost
48 of so doing, to an amount, however, not exceeding one per
49 cent of the assessed valuation of the above named property.
50 The amount so assessed shall be collected in the form of a
51 tax.

It shall be the duty of the commissioner of agriculture to 53 disseminate information concerning the brown-tail and gypsy 54 moths, San Jose scale, and other injurious insects.

Cities and towns may raise the sums necessary to carry 56 out the provisions of this section in the same manner in 57 which money is raised for other necessary municipal pur-58 poses.'
