STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE
HUNDRED AND THIRTEEN.

RESOLVE, in favor of a co-operative survey of the boundary
line between the State of Maine and the State of New Hamp-
shire.

Section 1. *Resolved:* That the Governor of the State be
2 authorized to appoint a surveyor on the part of the State of
3 Maine, who shall have power under his direction and in
4 conjunction with the surveyor to be appointed on the part
5 of the State of New Hampshire to ascertain, survey and
6 mark the dividing line between the State of Maine and the
7 State of New Hampshire and in conjunction with the prop-
8 er county and town officials of the counties and towns in-
9 tersected by said state line, erect or cause to be erected per-

10 manent monuments at the place of intersection of any coun-
11 ty, town or highway line with said state line and in addition
12 to such words, letters and dates on said monuments as may
13 be deemed necessary, shall have the elevations above sea
14 level indicated on said monuments.

Sect. 2. The sum of thirty-five hundred dollars is hereby
2 appropriated to be used therefor on the part of the State of
3 Maine when a like sum shall have been appropriated by the
4 State of New Hampshire to defray its part of the expenses
5 of said joint survey and markings.

Sect. 3. On completion of said survey the boundary line
2 so marked shall be and is hereby accepted as the official
3 boundary line between the State of Maine and the State of
4 New Hampshire.
