IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND FIFTEEN

AN ACT to amend Section forty-four of Chapter forty-one of the Revised Statutes as amended by section one of Chapter one hundred and thirteen of the Public Laws of nineteen hundred and thirteen relating to taking Smelts in Tide Waters.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:
Section forty-four of chapter forty-one of the revised stat2 utes as amended by section one of chapter one hundred and
3 thirteen of the public laws of nineteen hundred and thirteen
4 is hereby amended by inserting after the word "waters" in
5 the second line the following words: 'nor in any brook,
6 stream or river emptying into tide waters, within one thou-

7 sand feet of tide water,' so that said section as amended 8 shall read as follows:

'Sect. 44. No smelts shall be taken or fished for in tidal 10 waters, nor in any brook, stream or river emptying into 11 tide waters, within one thousand feet of tide waters, except 12 by hook or line, between the first days of April and Octo-13 ber, under a penalty of not less than ten, nor more than 14 thirty dollars for each offense, and a further penalty of 15 twenty cents for each smelt taken, and all weirs for the 16 capture of smelts shall be open and so remain, and all nets 17 used in the smelt and tomcod fishery shall be taken from 18 the water on or before the first day of April under a penalty 10 of not less than twenty, nor more than fifty dollars, and a 20 further fine of five dollars for each day that such weir or net 21 remains in violation of law. But weirs with catch pounds 22 covered with nets, the meshes of which are one inch square 23 in the clear, or greater, and weirs with catch pounds cov-24 ered with nets, which are erected and used for catching of 25 herring are not subject to this section. But no smelts caught 26 in such weirs after the first day of April, shall be sold or 27 offered for sale in this state, nor shall smelts caught in any 28 manner between the first day of April and the first day of 20 October following be offered for sale, sold or shipped from 30 the state under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each 31 offence: provided, however, that dip nets may be used be-32 tween the first day of April and the first day of May, and 33 all smelts caught by dip nets between said days may be 34 lawfully offered for sale and sold in this state; provided

35 further, that this section does not apply to smelts taken in the 36 Androscoggin river above Merrymeeting bay bridge, or in 37 Narraguagus bay or river between the first days of October 38 and November, nor to smelts taken in Penobscot river and 39 its tributaries between the first and thirtieth days of April, 40 nor to smelts taken in Casco Bay between the fifteenth day 41 of September and the first day of October, nor to smelts 42 taken in Franklin bay between the first day of April and the 43 first day of May, nor to smelts taken in Little Kennebec bay, 44 so called, or in Narraguagus bay or river, in the county of 45 Washington, between the first day of April and the twen-46 tieth day of May, nor to smelts taken in West bay and West 47 bay stream, so called, in the town of Gouldsboro, Hancock 48 county, nor to smelts taken in Tunk stream and Parritt and 49 Whitten stream, so called, in the town of Steuben in Wash-50 ington county, between the first day of April and the first 51 day of May, nor to smelts taken in Passamaquoddy bay, St. 52 Croix river and Cobscook bay and the coves and inlets trib-53 utary to these bays between the first day of September and 54 first day of October.'
