STATE OF MAINE

RESOLVE, in favor of aid in repairing highways in the town of Hebron.

Resolved, that there be and hereby is appropriated the sum 2 of three hundred dollars for the year 1915 and the sum of 3 three hundred dollars for the year 1916, to aid the town of 4 Hebron in repairing its highways; said appropriations to be 5 expended under the supervision of the State Highway Com-6 mission; provided that this resolves shall be void and of no 7 effect unless said town in accepting this appropriation there-8 by and in consideration thereof shall undertake that all road 9 material, including, clay, gravel, sand and rock necessary 10 for the improvement contemplated by this resolve shall be 11 furnished without expense to the State, and that said town 12 shall assume and pay all damages whatsoever arising from

13 the taking of land or from the change of grade, drainage or 14 alignment deemed by the State Highway Commission as 15 necessary for said improvement. Said way when so im-16 proved shall be thereafter continually maintained under the 17 direction and control of said Commission at the joint ex-18 pense of the State and said town; the charge against said 19 town for maintenance of said way shall not exceed fifty 20 percentum of the actual cost of such maintenance nor an 21 average of thirty dollars per mile per annum, and the pav-22 ment by said town of its said share of said maintenance 23 shall be enforced in the same manner as provided in sec-24 tions ten and twenty-five of chapter one hundred thirty of 25 the Public Laws of Nineteen Hundred and Thirteen. The 26 share of the State in said maintenance shall be paid out of 27 the fund for administration and maintenance created by vir-28 tue of section thirty-three of said chapter one hundred and 29 thirty.

STATEMENT OF FACTS.

The town of Hebron has a valuation of \$275,532; number of polls, 194, with 56 miles of road to maintain. The large amount of traffic over the town roads, due to the hauling of supplies to Hebron Academy and the Sanatorium, makes it very expensive for the town to keep its road in repair. These two institutions are exempt from taxation and have acquired a large amount of taxable property in the town and are still seeking to acquire more. The tax rate for 1914 was 23 mills.
