### STATE OF MAINE

RESOLVE in favor of Everett A. Record, Bryant's Pond,
Maine.

Record, That there be paid Everett A. Record of Bry-2 ant's Pond the sum of ten dollars per month, payable quar-

- 3 terly from the fund appropriated for military pensions, to
- 4 begin January first, nineteen hundred and fifteen, and con-
- 5 tinue during the pleasure of the egislature.



#### STATEMENT OF FACTS.

The said Everett A. Record of Bryant's Pond served in the regular army of the United States in Co. K, 5th U. S. Artillery. While in the service he contracted rheumatism and malarial poisoning, also had trouble with his eyes and received an injury in the back. No record having been made of these disabilities, he has been unable to secure a United States pension. Physicians have stated that he is incapacitated to do manual labor to the extent of one-half what an able-bodied man should do.

#### STATE OF MAINE.

Bryant's Pond, Feb. 17, 1915.

I hereby certify that I am the identical soldier who served in the regular army of the United States in K Battery, 5th U. S. Artillery; that while in said service I contracted rheumatism and malarial poisoning, also had trouble with my eyes and received an injury to my back. At my discharge no ratable record was made of these disabilities, so up to this time I have been unable to secure a United States pension.

I make this application to the State Legislature that I may receive aid from the State by special act.

I further declare that physicians have stated that I am incapacitated to do manual labor to the extent of one-half what an able-bodied man should do.

I ask that I may be granted a state pension in proportion to my disabilities. EVERETT A. RECORD.
