STATE OF MAINE

RESOLVE in favor of The Forks Plantation.

*Resolved, That the sum of one hundred fifty-two dollars
2 and fifty-seven cents be and hereby is appropriated for the
3 purpose of reimbursing the plantation of The Forks for
4 money expended on account of Oscar Isaacson, a state pau-
5 per; and that the State Treasurer be and hereby is author-
6 ized to pay and deliver said sum of one hundred fifty-two
7 dollars and fifty-seven cents to the treasurer of said The
8 Forks Plantation.*

STATEMENT OF FACTS.

The purpose of this resolve is to appropriate the sum of one hundred fifty-two dollars and fifty-seven cents to reimburse the plantation of The Forks for money expended in the care of one Oscar Isaacson, a state pauper. Oscar Isaacson had worked in and about The Forks from sometime in 1909 up until November, 1911, when he was taken sick in the woods and came out to The Forks. Dr. F. G. Williams of Bingham was called, and diagnosed the case as diphtheria. Isaacson was quarantined in The Forks hotel for some over two weeks and was attended by Dr. Williams. It became necessary to get a trained nurse from Lewiston to care for Isaacson. After the quarantine had been removed and Isaacson had left the plantation, the local board of health, not knowing just what to do in the matter, paid all the bills that had been contracted out of their own pockets, and were later reimbursed by the plantation. Because the assessors of the plantation did not know what to do in regard to presenting their claim to the state, the matter has never been adjusted.
