STATE OF MAINE

RESOLVE, In favor of the Town of Lubec.

*Resolved, That the sum of Two Hundred Forty-five Dol-
2 lars and fifty-two cents be and hereby is appropriated to be
3 paid to the town of Lubec to reimburse said town for
4 moneys expended for the care and burial of Charles Bezir-
5 jian, a State pauper.*

STATEMENT OF FACTS.

Charles Bezirjian, aged 22 years, was born somewhere in Armenia and came from there to Massachusetts and in the fall of 1913 moved to Trescott, Maine. He was never naturalized. On May the 14th, 1904, within the Township of Lubec he attempted to commit suicide by shooting himself and later died from the effects of the wounds, during which time there were two operations performed trying to locate and remove the bullet. He had no settlement in the State of Maine nor in any other State and had no means with which to employ medical aid or nursing and nothing with which to pay for his burial after his decease.
