STATEMENT OF FACTS.

The "Chase Merrill place," so called, is a parcel of real estate owned by the state in connection with the Maine School for Feeble Minded, having been originally purchased for water rights which were thought to be of value for the use of the state in furnishing a water supply or for power at the institution. It is situated about three and one-half miles from the school, on Collyer brook, from which the present water supply at the institution is taken, and consists of a set of farm buildings, house, ell and stable, with some sixty (60) acres of land. The buildings are in constant need of repair. The place is too far away from the school to be useful for farming purposes, and for these reasons it seems desirable that the place be sold.
