AN ACT to amend section one of chapter one hundred forty-one of the Private and Special Laws of eighteen hundred eighty-seven, entitled "An Act to amend An Act creating the Phillips Corporation."

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*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

Section one of chapter one hundred forty-one of the Private and Special Laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-seven is hereby amended by striking out the words "thence in a southeast course on Stephen Quimby's west line one hundred rods to the Mile Square road, so-called; thence same course on the Avon town line sixty-six rods" and in-

7 serting in place thereof the following words: "Thence in  
8 a southeast course on the Stephen Quimby west line eighty-  
9 nine rods to the northerly line of land of Lucian H. War-  
10 ren; thence westerly, following said Warren's northerly line,  
11 seven and one-half rods to the northwest corner of said  
12 Warren's land; thence southerly on said Warren's westerly  
13 line eleven rods to the Mile Square road, so-called, thence  
14 easterly along said Mile Square road seven and one-half  
15 rods to the original west line of the Stephen Quimby land,  
16 said point being the southeast corner of the original home-  
17 stead lot of said Warren; thence southeasterly on the same  
18 course as the said Stephen Quimby west line, sixty-six rods,  
19 to the Avon town line;' so that said section as amended  
20 shall read as follows:

'Section 1. The territory embraced within the following  
2 limits is hereby created a body politic and corporate by the  
3 name of the Phillips Village Corporation, to wit: com-  
4 mencing at a monument on the town line between Phillips  
5 and Avon, and on the west bank of the Sandy river; thence  
6 south eighty degrees, west on said town line two hundred  
7 and eighty rods, to a monument in the corner of the stone  
8 wall between the William Ross and John Record farms;  
9 thence in a northerly course on line of said Ross and Record  
10 farms, ninety-eight rods to a monument in the fence on the  
11 northeast side of the William Ross farm; thence same  
12 course, seventy-four rods, to an elm tree in the Charles  
13 Ross pasture, marked with a spot on the north and west

14 sides; thence same course, twenty-seven rods to a yellow  
15 birch tree marked with a spot on the north and south sides;  
16 thence same course, forty-three rods to a spruce tree marked  
17 with a spot on the north and south sides; thence same  
18 course, forty-three rods, to the southwest corner of George  
19 A. French's field on the north side of the lake road, below  
20 the D. D. Graffam farm; thence northeasterly on line of  
21 the west end of George A. French's field one hundred and  
22 twenty-five rods, to two yellow birch trees on the north side  
23 of the Kelley road, so-called; thence in a northwesterly di-  
24 rection on the north side of said road one hundred and  
25 forty rods, to the northwest corner of land owned by Mrs. Ira  
26 Fuller; thence in a northeast course, on lot line of land owned  
27 by Mrs. Ira Fuller, Martin C. Kelley, Raymond Ross and  
28 others, one hundred and eighty-six rods, to the river road  
29 on the west side of the Sandy river; thence in a southerly  
30 direction on the east side of said road sixty-six rods, to  
31 a cedar post in the fence opposite Raymond Ross' house;  
32 thence in a northeast course eighty rods to a cedar post  
33 in the corner of the fence in front of Frank Beal's house;  
34 thence in a northeast course on line of fence between Frank  
35 Beal and D. L. Dennison, forty rods to the west bank of  
36 the Sandy river; thence in a southerly direction on the west  
37 bank of said river one hundred and ten rods, to an oak  
38 tree on the bank of the river marked with a spot on the  
39 north and east sides; thence easterly across said river to  
40 a small stone bridge south of S. D. McKenney's house forty

41 rods; thence in a southerly course on the line of the river  
42 road on the east side of said river, forty-eight rods to the  
43 northwest corner of land owned by John R. Wetzl; thence  
44 in a northeast course, on line of land owned by the afore-  
45 said Wetzl and Benjamin Johnson, forty rods to a monu-  
46 ment in the fence in the northeast corner of land owned  
47 by John R. Wetzl; thence in a southerly direction on said  
48 Wetzl's east line sixteen rods; thence easterly on lot line  
49 of land owned by Benjamin Johnson and William Shepard,  
50 ninety-four rods to the northwest corner of land owned by  
51 Stephen Quimby; thence in a southeast course on the Ste-  
52 phen Quimby west line eighty-nine rods to the northerly  
53 line of land of Lucian H. Warren; thence westerly, follow-  
54 ing said Warren's northerly line, seven and one-half rods  
55 to the northwest corner of said Warren's land; thence south-  
56 erly on said Warren's westerly line eleven rods to the Mile  
57 Square road, so-called, thence easterly along said Mile  
58 Square road seven and one-half rods to the original west  
59 line of the Stephen Quimby land, said point being the south-  
60 east corner of the original homestead lot of said Warren;  
61 thence southeasterly on the same course as the said Ste-  
62 phen Quimby west line, sixty-six rods, to the Avon town  
63 line; thence south eighty degrees west, thence south eighty  
64 degrees west forty rods to the stone monument near the  
65 line bridge, so-called; thence same course across the river  
66 to the place of beginning, eighty rods, more or less, the  
67 same estimated to contain six hundred acres, more or less.'
