House Amendment "A" to House Document No. 519, entitled "An Act authorizing Fort Kent Electric Company, its successors and assigns, to erect and maintain a dam across Wallagrass stream in Wallagrass Plantation, Aroostook county, at its power station as now located on said Wallagrass stream."

Amend House Document No. 519, entitled "An Act author-
2 izing Fort Kent Electric Company, its successors and assigns,
3 to erect and maintain a dam across Wallagrass stream in
4 Wallagrass Plantation, Aroostook county, at its power sta-

5 tion as now located on said Wallagrass stream," by adding
6 thereto the following, to be known as section 5, of said Doc-
7 ument No. 519.

‘Sect. 5. It shall be unlawful for said corporation to trans-
2 mit electric current for sale or use beyond the limits of this
3 State, or to contract with any person, firm or corporation
4 for the transmission or sale of electric current beyond the
5 limits of this State and said corporation shall not be per-
6 mitted to acquire in any manner the franchises of or con-
7 solidate with or transfer or lease its property, rights and
8 franchises to any other corporation, firm or person now
9 transmitting or having the right to transmit electric power
10 beyond the confines of the State, without express authority
11 of the Legislature.’
