STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND NINETEEN

AN ACT to change the name of Whetstone pond, in Abbot and Blanchard, in the county of Piscataquis, to Slyvan Lake.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1. The name of the pond known as Whetstone

- 2 pond, the same being situated in the towns of Abbot and
- 3 Blanchard, in the county of Piscataquis, is hereby changed
- 4 to Sylvan lake.

Sect. 2. All acts, or parts of acts, inconsistent with this 2 act are hereby repealed.

To the Legislature of the State of Maine.

We inhabitants of the towns of Abbot and Blanchard do respectfully petition your honorable legislature to change the name of the pond now known as Whetstone pond lying in the towns of Kingsbury and Blanchard to "Slyvan Lake."

STATEMENT OF FACTS.

The little pond now known as Whetstone pond is about one and one-half miles long and about one-half mile wide located in the towns of Blanchard and Kingsbury, the larger part being in the town of Blanchard.

It lies on the west side of the highway leading from Blanchard to Kingsbury, close to the highway and is getting to be quite a summer resort.

There are at the present time sixteen cottages on its shores.

My farm is situated on the north shore of said pond and several years ago my two young girls, while there, made the words "Slyvan Lake" by placing white pebbles in the sand, and it has been so called more or less since, and as one of them has since passed away I am anxious that it should retain that name. I presume why it was called Whetstone was because the rocks on the shore resemble whetstones, so called, or scythe stones. It is impossible on account of sickness and the distance to some of the cottage owners for me to reach them all as some live in Massachusetts and some in Canada who spend their vacations here.
