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AN ACT to Amend Chapter Sixty-seven of the Revised Statutes as Amended by Section One of Chapter One Hundred Thirty-three of the Public Laws of Nineteen Hundred Seventeen, Relating to the Fees Paid to Registers of Probate to be Paid to the Treasurers of Their Respective Counties.

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Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

That chapter sixty-seven of the revised statutes as amended by section one of chapter one hundred thirty-three of the public laws of nineteen hundred seventeen be and **here-** by is amended by adding after the word "account," being the last word in section fifty-two of said chapter sixty-seven, the following:

‘And all such fees shall be paid by the registers of probate to the treasurers of their respective counties quarterly on the first days of January, April, July and October of each year.’ So that said section fifty-two as amended shall read as follows:

‘Within two months after the qualification of an executor, administrator, guardian of an adult, or conservator, the register of probate shall cause public notice of such appointment to be given, and shall enter upon the docket the name of the newspaper and the date of the first publication. Such notice may be given in a list showing the name of the estate, the name and residence of each person appointed and, in each case where an agent has been appointed, the name and residence of such agent. Such executor, administrator, guardian or conservator may be required to give such further notice of his appointment as the judge may order. At the time of his qualification, such executor, administrator, conservator or guardian of an adult shall pay to the register of probate the cost of such public notice, together with such reasonable fee for such additional duty as may be fixed by the judge and he shall be allowed said sums in his account, and all such fees shall be paid by the registers of probate to the treasurers of their respective counties quarterly on the first days of January, April, July and October of each year.’
