STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND NINETEEN

RESOLVE, in favor of Mary A. Carroll, of Southwest Harbor.

Resolved: That there be allowed and paid out of the ap-2 propriation for payment of teachers' pensions, to Mary A. 3 Carroll of Southwest Harbor, in the county of Hancock, 4 the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars per annum, during 5 the lifetime of said Mary A. Carroll, the same to be in lieu 6 of the teacher's pension now allowed by law to her.

STATEMENT OF FACTS.

"I retired before the law for teachers' pensions was passed. Therefore I have half a pension only.

"My parents, and all their children, except myself, have passed on, leaving me without legal claim on home or income; without claim on place to lay my head in case of sickness; or means to pay my board or nursing.

"I was born at Mt. Desert, May 7, 1835. I received my education at home and in the common schools; and a partial course in Castine Normal School.

"I began my first term of public school Dec. 8, 1857. I taught 2, 3 or 4 terms a year for 48 years—120 terms of town and state school, and many terms of private school—mostly in Hancock County, Me. I taught some large schools. But when a small, poor or remote school called I went, though the pay, was small. I bought, at my own expense, charts for teaching writing, drawing, and primary reading. Towns did not, then, buy helps for teaching. The pleasure of seeing my pupils improve rapidly paid me. In winter I taught many free evening schools. I taught town and state schools on outer islands, crossing often in small boats in winter. My last term of state school closed on Duck Island Light Station, June, 1905. I threw my whole mind into my schools always doing my best, not sparing expense when I could buy anything that would make lessons more interesting.

"And, now, I very respectfully, ask the legislature, to grant me an increase of teacher's pension from \$125.00 to \$250.00 per year. Being 84 years old next May, I may not need it long. Wishing all in the legislature a happy New Year, I am
