To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives of the Seventy-ninth Legislature:

Herewith is submitted the biennial report of the State Auditor covering the financial operations of the State for the past two years.

I recommend a general appropriation for the maintenance of the Maine State Prison, the same as is made for all other State institutions. Formerly the carriage, harness and broom industries carried on at the institution earned an income sufficient to pay the running expenses, exclusive, however, of salaries, medicine, etc. In the past six years, the increasing use of the automobile to the detriment of the carriage and harness industries, together with the great rise in prices of all subsistence supplies, has had the effect of showing a steadily increasing deficit in the net expense of operating the prison. The law requiring all payments of accounts to be made to the warden, chapter 142, section 55, R. S., should be repealed, as it is now inapplicable.

The act to provide for State and county aid in the construction of highway bridges, chapter 319, Public Laws of 1915, now included as an appendix of the Revised Statutes of 1916 and known as the State bridge law, was considered of sufficient importance to be referred to the people at a special election. A 1917 amendment of that act, however, by which the provisions of the law were extended to main thoroughfares in unorganized townships, was enacted without being referred to the people. This raises the question whether or not an act accepted by the people can be effectually amended without like approval of the amendment. I believe this question has never before arisen in this State, although the primary election law, which was an initiated act, in order to make that act workable was amended in some of its minor details. The present case, however, embraces a departure from the former existing law nearly if not quite as radical as the original statute intended.

In 1917 several resolves were considered by the committee on claims carrying sums of money that were properly charged to the State contingent fund. With the understanding that they were to be paid from that fund they were returned to the branch in which they originated with the endorsement "indefinitely postponed." I suggest that hereafter the reasons for the postponement be endorsed upon any such resolves, as otherwise the record, being incomplete, may show that accounts have been allowed that have been rejected by the Legislature.

Federal statutes for public buildings usually provide that appropriations for such buildings shall be available until the completion of the contract. I believe that some action along this line by the present Legislature relative to public buildings to be erected by this State would be desirable in view of the fact that under conditions obtaining

for several years past it is sometimes necessary to carry an appropriation for a new building over a period of several years.

The various examining boards, among others those regulating the registration of physicians and surgeons and the registration of dentists, are limited in their expenditures to the fees collected from applicants. However, the statutes are often confused by resolves appropriating additional amounts to be expended by such boards. I recommend that in order to effectually amend an act that a resolve should be required to state by chapter and section what act it amends and that in any event such amendatory resolve shall not be deemed to be in effect longer than for the period of the Legislature enacting it.

All fines for violations of the laws regulating the operation of motor vehicles are paid to the counties where the action is had. The State, however, pays all costs of enforcing such laws. It would seem as if the State should receive the benefit of these fines or that the counties should pay the costs of same.

Section 9 of chapter 29, Revised Statutes, provides that no soldier or sailor who served by enlistment in the army or navy of the United States shall be considered a pauper. Section 7, of the same chapter, states that if any town furnishes relief to any former inmate of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, at Togus, "who becomes a pauper after his connection with said National Home has ceased," that such expenses shall be reimbursed by the State. These two sections, one stating that a soldier shall never become a pauper and the other outlining a procedure in case he becomes one, are entirely contradictory and should be reconciled.

In the recent revision of the statutes in 1916 the laws governing two of the State institutions, the Bath Military and Naval Orphan Asylum and the Maine School for the Deaf, were not brought within the statutes. These institutions are as much a part of the State's activities in their several lines as are any other of the State institutions. The reason for their omission from the completed revision is probably that when the acts passed making them State institutions, such acts were by error included in the classification of private and special rather than public acts.

In 1911, acting upon a recommendation of the first State auditor, the Legislature passed the following resolve: "Resolved, that the treasurer of State and his successor in office be and he hereby is the trustee under the will of Isaac Sanford to keep the legacy of six hundred dollars as provided in said will. And be it further resolved: that the State shall set apart annually a sum equal to six per centum on said legacy, and shall pay such interest, under direction of the governor and council, as aid toward the education of the deaf, dumb and blind natives of Maine, in institutions established for the education of such persons, provided that if in future it is deemed inadvisable to continue the payment of such interest, the principal sum and any accrued interest

shall be expended as the governor and council shall order." Beginning with the year 1911 there has been an annual appropriation of \$36.00 representing the interest on this sum at six per cent., but as there has never been action taken as to this interest it has been at the close of each year lapsed into the treasury. I recommend action by the present Legislature in regard to this matter.

In 1911 was begun the policy of making straight appropriations for the work of various departments and eliminating in many cases what had been customary up to that time, viz: the addition of fees to appropriations, to be expended in addition to such appropriations. This policy was fairly adhered to at the legislative sessions of 1913 and 1915, but the 1917 session was marked by a number of acts which again authorized fees to be added to appropriations. The following are examples: Chapter 118, Sect. 9, P. L. 1917, adding certain amounts to the appropriation for superintendence of towns comprising school unions, such amounts to be used for defraying traveling expenses of agents. Chapter 178, P. L. 1917, relative to expenses charged to towns for destroying trees or plants infested with the white pine blister rust, such fees and costs to be credited to the appropriation for that purpose. Chapter 66, P. L. 1917, relating to license fees for non-resident fishermen, such fees to be set apart as a fund to be expended by the Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Game, with the approval of the Governor and Council; also, specific amount, to wit, \$5,542.27, to be used under the direction of the Governor and Council in screening certain lakes and ponds, (chapter 111, resolves 1917), which amount was likewise to be deducted from said non-resident fishermen's licenses. Chapter 137, P. L. 1917, authorizing the State Superintendent of Public Schools to collect registration fees of teachers and use such fees for certain purposes. Chapter 214, P. L. 1917, amending chapter 38, R. S., providing that the Commissioner of Agriculture may collect license fees from nurserymen and add such fees to the appropriation for the bureau of horticulture to be used exclusively for the inspection of nursery stock introduced into the State from outside the State. Chapter 298, P. L. 1917, relating to small loans, states that the salary and traveling expenses of a special bank examiner be paid out of fees received from licenses issued under the provisions of that act. Chapter 147, P. L. 1917, provides that the Bank Commissioner may license the sale of the bonds of certain electric railroads and that all sums so collected shall be added to the appropriation for the banking department, to be expended by the Bank Commissioner under the authority and with the approval of the Governor and Council. I believe that the passage of acts authorizing fees to be added to appropriations should be discontinued.

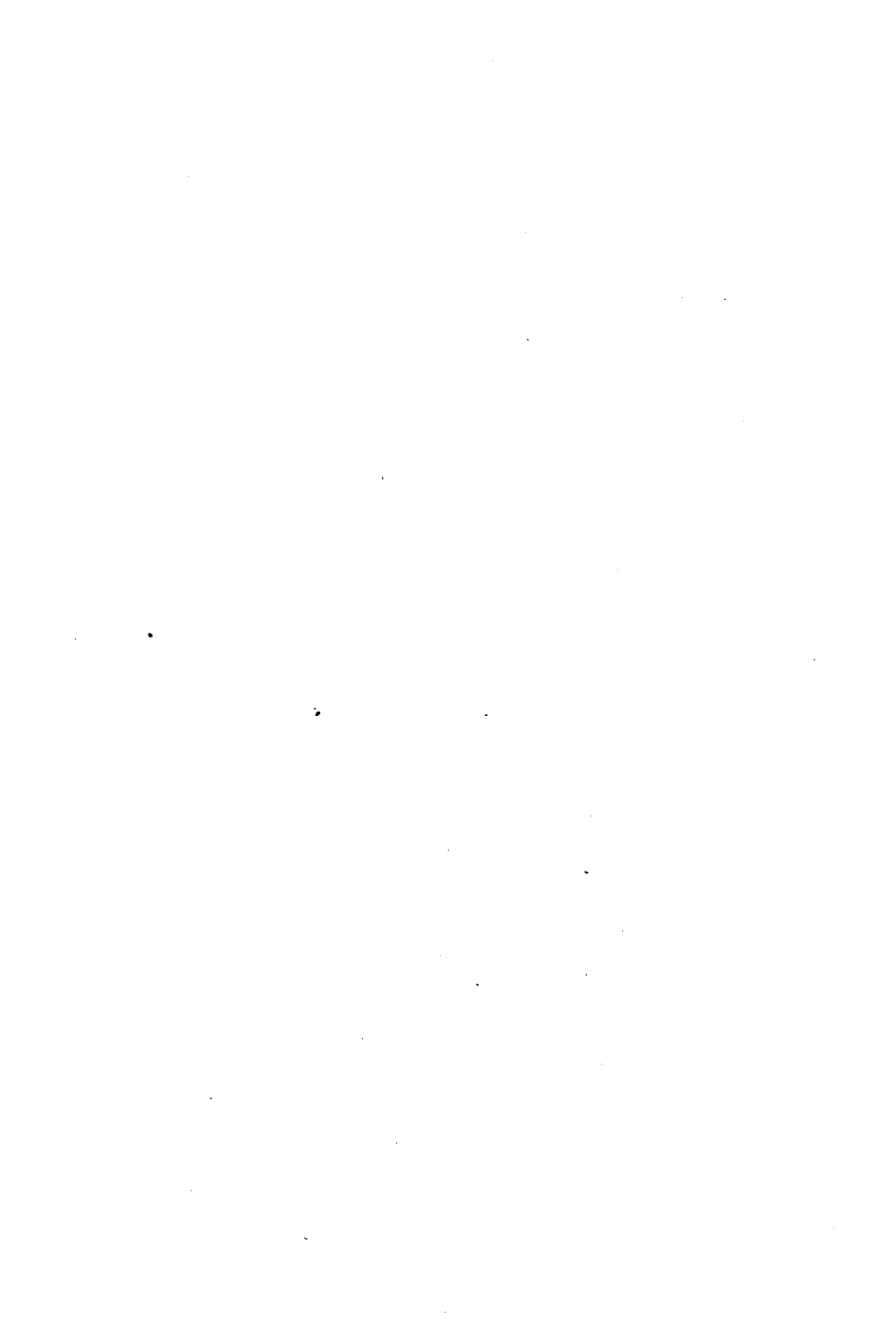
