STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND NINETEEN

AN ACT to Amend Chapter Two Hundred and Forty-four, Section One, of the Public Laws of Nineteen Hundred and Seventeen, Relating to the Duties of the Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Game.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section one of chapter two hundred and forty-four of 2 the revised statutes is hereby amended by adding after the

- 3 word "department," in the twelfth line thereof, the words:
- 4 'He may also maintain a museum in which may be exhibited
- 5 specimens of game and fish, an aquarium for the exhibition

6 of live fish, minerals, and historic documents and relics 7 connected with the history of the state'; also by adding 8 to said section the following words: 'Sections forty-one 9 to forty-four, inclusive, of chapter forty-four, of the revised 10 statutes, is hereby repealed'; so that as amended said sec11 tion shall read as follows:

'Section 1. Office of commissioner of inland fisheries and 2 game created. The governor, with the advice and consent 3 of the council, shall appoint a commissioner of inland fish-4 eries and game who shall hold office for three years, and 5 until his successor is appointed and qualified. Said com-6 missioner shall be provided with an office in the state cap-7 itol, with suitable furniture, stationery and other facilities 8 for the transaction of the business of the department, and 9 he may appoint a clerk. He may employ attorneys at trials 10 and inferior courts for violations of the provisions of the II inland fish and game laws, and may appoint necessary ad-12 ditional clerks in his office, and may have at least three 13 daily newspapers published in the state, to be selected by 14 him, for use in his office, all of which shall be paid for 15 out of the regular appropriation for his department. He 16 may also maintain a museum in which may be exhibited 17 specimens of game and fish, an aquarium for the exhibition 18 of live fish, minerals, and historic documents and relics 19 connected with the history of the state. He shall, on or 20 before the thirty-first day of December of each year, make 21 an annual report to the governor. Sections forty-one to 22 forty-four, inclusive, of chapter forty-four of the revised 23 statutes, is hereby repealed.'
