STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND
NINE HUNDRED AND NINETEEN

AN ACT in Relation to the Employment of Clerks and Necessary Assistants by the Superintendent of Public Printing.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Paragraph two of section seventeen of chapter one hundred and seventeen of the revised statutes is hereby amended by striking out in the first line of said paragraph the words, "state auditor," and by inserting in place thereof the word, 'governor'; also by striking out in the third line thereof the words, "the governor and"; also by striking out in the third and fourth lines of said paragraph the words, "he shall receive an annual salary of fifteen hundred

9 dollars," and by inserting in place thereof the words, 'he
10 may employ one or more clerks and assistants as the bus-
11 iness of his office may demand, their number and the amount
12 of their compensation to be subject to the approval of the
13 governor and council'; so that as amended said paragraph
14 shall read as follows:

'The governor shall appoint a superintendent of public
2 printing, as provided in section thirty-seven of chapter
3 three, whose appointment shall be approved by the council.
4 He may employ one or more clerks and assistants as the
5 business of his office may demand, their number and the
6 amount of their compensation to be subject to the approval
7 of the governor and council.'
