STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-ONE

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:

As required by Chapter 102, of the Public Laws of 1919, the Budget Committee, having received written statements from the heads of departments, state institutions, commissions and boards of trustees who are entrusted with the expenditure of public money; and from individuals, corporations, associations, boards and institutions, whether public or private, receiving or requesting appropriations from the state; and having held hearings in various sections of the state with due notice to parties interested and to the general public, respectfully presents tables showing estimated income from sources other than direct taxation for each of the fiscal periods named in said Chapter 102, together with estimates showing the amounts that are deemed necessary to defray the several charges and expenses of the public service, for charitable and benevolent institutions, new buildings or the renovation of old buildings of the state institutions, and the rate of direct taxation that will be required to produce the necessary amount of revenue in each fiscal period.

The committee has confined its recommendations to the requirements of the public service and those institutions and organizations to the support of which the state is already committed by law or custom. New enterprises, however worthy of consideration by the legislature, are not included in the committee's estimates. This report is intended to bring to the legislature near the opening of the session information which will assist in the early determination of the amount of revenue required for the support of the necessary public business and those quasi-public, charitable and benevolent institutions that look regularly to the state for aid. The legislature can then more readily decide how much further revenue shall be raised and for what purposes it shall be spent.

It is proper to start with the current assets available January 1, 1921. The cash balance on that date was 5,550,702.63, accounts due from the federal government totaled 3366,626.96, from municipalities 52,219.20, and from other sources 105,492.17, a total of 6,075,040.96. Some large sums in the way of unexpended appropriations stand as liabilities against this total of assets. The chief items are the highway and bridge construction accounts and the soldiers' bonus. It is impossible to determine so early in the month of January the exact balance of assets over liabilities which, in the form of the state contingent fund, will be available for expenditure in the first fiscal period. This sum in the judgment of the committee, will not exceed 3% of the total budget, certainly a small margin of safety in a financial program covering two and one-half years. This balance may, therefore, be properly disregarded in making up the budget.

INCOME

Appendix "A" attached hereto shows the estimated income from all sources other than direct taxation. It should be noted that all income from state institutions is included in these estimates and even in the cases where the law permits income to be added to the appropriation the total appropriation required is estimated as an expenditure. This is the present practice for the sake of uniformity and to allow subdivision of maintenance appropriations. If it is desired to leave income to be added to appropriations as permitted by law the income items should be omitted and the proposed appropriations correspondingly reduced. If the present plan is continued an appropriate general statute might be advisable.

CHANGE IN FISCAL YEAR

One effect of the Budget Law is to change the fiscal year so that beginning June 30, 1922, the fiscal year will end on June 30 of each year and each legislature will make appropriations for two years from July 1st following its session. To carry this change into effect this legislature must appropriate for two and one-half years instead of two years. As the laws are at present, much the larger part of the indirect revenue of the state comes into the treasury in the latter half of the calendar year, that is, after July 1. The direct revenue from taxation is not due until December first of each year. The greatest problem of the committee has been to provide sufficient revenue for the period of six months from January 1st, to June 30th,

1921. A glance at Appendix "D," the summary of revenue and proposed expenditures, will show that under existing laws estimated revenue in that six months period would fall short of proposed expenditures by \$2,590,768.82. It is impossible to meet this deficit by direct taxation for no direct tax can be assessed and collected within the required time. The committee can imagine no new form of indirect taxation which could be put into force and made to yield the necessary revenue before July 1st of this year. The proposal is, therefore, to meet the situation by changing the due dates of the taxes on express companies, parlor and sleeping car companies, telegraph companies, railroad companies, telephone companies, and land in unincorporated places, so that the total revenue from these sources. estimated at \$2,683,500.51 in 1921, will be available before instead of after July 1st. This proposal would increase no tax and would create no hardship except the payment from a few days to a few months earlier in the year.

The special item showing revenue from the tax on land in unincorporated places in the fiscal year 1922-23 is included because if the recommendation of the committee is adopted and the tax on wild lands made payable before July 1st, the tax received in the year 1923 will be on the new valuation, probably a larger increase than the figure estimated.

MAINTENANCE AND OPERATING EXPENSES

Appendix "B" contains the estimates for maintenance and operating expenses of state departments and institutions and those benevolent and educational institutions that are customarily aided by the state. The general estimates for the departments have been made on the basis of the existing pay roll and for the institutions on the basis of the per capita cost for the full year ending June 30, 1920, with due allowance for prospective increase of population. It is expected that food, clothing and materials in general will show a sharp decline below the period referred to. On the other hand railroad travel and transportation charges will show an increase.

ADJUTANT GENERAL

The military fund, now fixed by law at \$45,000, must be increased to at least \$100,000, in order to make sufficient funds available to comply with the program of the federal government for increasing the national guard to about four times its former strength. A large appropriation is also recommended for the publication of the valuable report of the Adjutant General for the period of the war. This report contains the military record of each man from Maine who served in the Great War.

INLAND FISH AND GAME

The recommendation of the amount of \$100,000 a year is with the expectation that the present practice of allowing the department its fees in excess of \$50,000 will continue. The same result could of

course be secured by decreasing the recommendation to \$50,000 and allowing the department all its fees. These fees in 1920 amounted to \$106,716.37 and will probably increase.

WATER POWER COMMISSION

Under the provisions of the act creating the Water Power Commission its existence terminates in August, 1921. In these circumstances the committee has recommended sufficient appropriation to continue the work of the commission on its present basis for the first six months period, leaving further appropriations to be determined after the legislature has decided whether and in what form the commission is to continue.

SUPREME JUDICIAL AND SUPERIOR COURTS

The committee has not felt called upon to make recommendations about salary increases in general. The salaries of the judges of the Supreme Judicial and Superior Courts are, however, so meagre for the service rendered and so much below the average in other states that it is hoped the suggested increase will be granted by common consent without involving the members of the court in any of the embarrassing discussions incidental to the general readjustment of salaries.

STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION

Revenue from automobile fees and expenditures for maintenance, administration and payment of interest and principal on highway bonds are omitted from the tables. According to existing law these items are provided for from automobile fees and it is believed that the indicated source of revenue will be sufficient through the fiscal periods under consideration. For the same reason the committee has no recommendation regarding the issuance of further highway loan bonds during the years 1922-23. It is believed that the interest on any bonds that the legislature may see fit to authorize up to the fuil amounts suggested by the Highway Commission can be provided for out of automobile fees.

Because the general law provides for an appropriation of \$100,000.00 annually for state aid in the construction of bridges, the committee has included this sum in the estimates for each of the fiscal years 1921-22 and 1922-23. The last legislature at its special session passed an act providing that obligations of the state under the bridge act for the year 1920 and up to July 1st, 1921, should be met from the proceeds of the highway and bridge bonds. Amounts required for this purpose for the fiscal years in question will far exceed the appropriation provided by law. If it is decided to continue the policy of meeting these demands out of proceeds of bridge bonds these two items may be omitted from the estimates and the total reduced \$200,000.00.

STATE SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Included in the recommendations for this department during the first six months are several large items totaling \$200,500.00 which under existing law are taken out of the school and mill fund. The next collection of the school and mill fund is in December, 1921, a different fiscal year. To avoid confusion in the transition period it is suggested that the amounts required in this first six months be appropriated out of the general fund.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS. APPENDIX "C"

Appropriations for new buildings for state institutions are recommended to be made available during the first six months but continued during the whole two years or until completed. Two reasons suggest this course. First, all these buildings are needed without unnecessary delay; second, sound policy requires that public work be done on a large scale in times of business depression to take up the slack of labor and materials caused by the decrease in ordinary demand.

AUGUSTA AND BANGOR STATE HOSPITALS

Many of the requests of these two institutions seem to come properly under the head of ordinary repairs and maintenance and have been considered under the corresponding recommendations. The sum of \$8,000 is necessary for equipping the new wing now nearing completion at Augusta and the construction of a nurses' home at each institution is needed for efficiency. The room in the wards made vacant by this provision for the comfort of the nurses would be available for additional patients.

MAINE SCHOOL FOR THE FEEBLE-MINDED

The large appropriation for additions is the expression of the committee's belief that the capacity of this school ought to be doubled at once. There are about two hundred now on the waiting list, more than a hundred inmates of the two state hospitals, the state schools for boys and girls, the men's and women's reformatories ought to be transferred to this school. More than eighty per cent of the feeblemindedness now existing in the state is inherited and therefore preventable. Confinement of all necessary cases in the institution may be expected to reduce feeble-mindedness by four-fifths in the next generation. The \$450,000.00 recommended would probably build three dormitories holding 300 inmates, a power house, a dining hall adjacent to the present commodious kitchen, and possibly also a spur track from the Grand Trunk Railroad. The latter improvement would be of great value in the building program and would thereafter lessen very much the maintenance charges of the institution especially for such heavy items as fuel.

MAINE STATE PRISON

Six years ago there was much discussion in the legislature regarding the policy to be followed with the Maine State Prison. It was agreed that the plant was out of date, unsanitary and a disgrace to an intelligent and progressive state. The question was whether to rebuild the plant or move elsewhere and start new. The former course was decided upon and now only the construction of a new block of modern cells remains to be done in order to bring the whole plant up to date. The population of the prison is decreasing because of better enforcement of law and because many who would in former days have been sentenced to state prison will in the future be given a chance at the Reformatory for Men. The suggested appropriation will be enough to provide modern cells for all the prospective inmates for many years to come.

TUBERCULOSIS SANATORIUMS

Cottages for the staff seem to be the most urgent need at the Central Maine Sanatorium. Liberal provision for improvements and repairs in existing buildings has been made in the maintenance appropriation for the Western Maine Sanatorium.

STATE REFORMATORY FOR WOMEN

The suggested appropriation will provide one new cottage and extensive repairs on existing buildings together with considerable new equipment.

STATE SCHOOL FOR BOYS

The appropriation is for the purpose of building a central school building so that the boys may have their lessons away from their dormitories. Existing equipment can be transferred to the new building and by doing much of the work with the labor of the boys the building can be built within the modest sum requested.

UNIVERSITY OF MAINE

The committee has approached the consideration of the problem of the proper maintenance of the University of Maine with full consciousness of the great importance of this institution in the educational system of the state and the obligation of the state to provide suitably for its support. During each of the two years 1917-18 the state appropriation was \$127,500. The institution reported a considerable deficit two years ago and was given an appropriation of \$170,-000.00 in the hope that this would exceed the cost of maintenance and that the debt could gradually be reduced. During the college year ending June 30, 1919, the deficit was \$14,364.66. During the year ending June 30, 1920, it was \$11,189.92. During this period there was no increase in tuition over the rates prevailing years ago. The Law School was being maintained at a considerable loss. There were large expenditures in the Experiment Station which left that part of the institution heavily in debt to the general fund.

During the present and succeeding years the revenue from tuition will be very largely increased both from added numbers and higher rate of tuition. The expense of the Law School has been discontinued. The trustees are planning a policy which will bring the gradual liquidation of the debt owed by the Experiment Station. A bequest from a philanthropic citizen of Bangor will soon begin to yield income at the rate of about \$25,000 annually. The amount recommended for maintenance by the committee is an increase for the full budget period of \$150,000. Taking all the above facts into consideration and anticipating reduction in price of some necessities, notably fuel, it is believed that the rate proposed will permit full and adequate maintenance of the University with a substantial reduction of the debt.

APPENDIX "D"

SUMMARY OF REVENUE AND APPROPRIATIONS

It will be seen from this table that a state tax rate of six mills for each of the years 1921 and 1922 will provide for the expenditures recommended. Of this tax three mills are returned directly to the towns for education, one mill is expended for roads with about a half mill more by direct appropriation out of the general fund. The total amount required for interest and retirement of war bonds and soldiers' bonus bonds will also call for the proceeds of about one mill tax. In fact a law might well be enacted setting aside one mill for these war purposes and the payment of pensions, the balance to be erected into a sinking fund for the retirement of the million-dollar war loan at maturity. Whether this statute be enacted or not, the fact remains that out of the six mills tax proposed only one-half mill is for general state purposes. All the rest goes for schools, roads, and to pay obligations growing out of the war.

The various tables referred to are appended to this report and in addition the committee has on file for the use of the legislature all the information upon which these figures are based, including stenographic report of the testimony and remarks at all the hearings.
