STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND
NINE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-ONE

AN ACT to Amend Section Two of Chapter Five Hundred and Seventy-four, Private and Special Laws of Eighteen Hundred and Fifty-six, entitled "An Act to Incorporate the Kendall's Mills Village Corporation," as Amended by Chapter One Hundred and Thirty-nine, Private and Special Laws of Eighteen Hundred and Ninety-one.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section two, of chapter five hundred and seventy-four,
2 private and special laws of eighteen hundred and fifty-six,
3 entitled "An Act to incorporate the Kendall's Mills Village
4 Corporation," as amended by chapter one hundred and
5 thirty-nine, private and special laws of eighteen hundred
6 and ninety-one, is hereby amended by striking out the word

7 “and” in the twelfth line thereof and adding to said section
8 at the end thereof, the following words, ‘and for sprinkling
9 the streets within said corporation limits’, so that said sec-
10 tion as amended shall read as follows:

‘Sect. 2. Said corporation is hereby authorized and vested
2 with the power at any legal meeting called for the purposes
3 to raise money to defray the expenses of a night watch, of
4 a police, and all other necessary measures, for the better
5 security of life and property, and for the promotion of good
6 order, and the observance of the laws within its limits;
7 for purchasing and keeping in repair engines and other
8 apparatus for the extinguishment of fires, for the construc-
9 tion of reservoirs and aqueducts to supply water; for the
10 erection and keeping in repair suitable engine houses; for
11 organizing and maintaining an efficient fire department; for
12 ringing the bell, for constructing and maintaining public
13 sewers within said corporation limits; and for sprinkling
14 the streets within said corporation limits.’
