STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-ONE

RESOLVE, to Increase the Salary of Judge of the Municipal Court in Gardiner.

Resolved: That section ten of chapter two hundred and 2 forty-seven of the private and special laws of nineteen hun-3 dred and eleven, entitled "An Act with reference to the 4 Gardiner Municipal. Court," be amended so that said sec-5 tion shall read as follows:

'Sect. 10. The salary of said judge shall be one thousand 2 dollars and such fees as are allowed by the general law, 3 and the same shall be payable quarterly out of the treasury 4 of the county of Kennebec, on the first day of January, 5 April, July and October. All fines and costs received in

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6 criminal cases shall be paid quarterly into the county treas-7 ury; and no salary shall be paid to said judge until he shall 8 file with the county treasurer, a written statement of the 9 fines and criminal costs by him received during and for the 10 preceding quarter.'

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STATEMENT OF FACTS

Salary fixed at \$800 in 1897; previously \$600. The law did not require that encumbent should be an attorney until 1911.

Civil jurisdiction raised from \$100 to \$200 in 1911. Up to 1911, the Gardiner court had concurrent jurisdiction in all the towns in the lower end of the county; now it has exclusive jurisdiction of all offences arising in Gardiner, West Gardiner, Farmingdale, Randolph and Pittston.

Civil entries in 1919 were 94; 1920, 103.

Criminal entries in 1918 were 135; 1919, 101; 1920, 123. Fines and costs paid into the county treasury in 1920 were \$909.77.

The court received as a part of his compensation in the year 1917, fees from liquor libels, amounting to \$207.06. In 1920 he received from the same source, \$3.57.
