#### STATE OF MAINE

## IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-ONE

AN ACT to Amend Section Twenty-seven of Chapter Nine of the Revised Statutes as Amended by Chapter Forty-two of the Public Laws of Nineteen Hundred and Seventeen Relating to the Taxation of Steam Railroads.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section twenty-seven of chapter nine of the revised stat-2 utes as amended by chapter forty-two of the public laws

- 3 of nineteen hundred and seventeen is hereby amended by
- 4 adding at the end of said section the following: 'Provided,
- 5 however, that during the years nineteen hundred and twenty-
- 6 two and nineteen hundred and twenty-three the rate shall
- 7 not exceed four per cent of such gross transportation re-

8 ceipts; and provided also that any such annual excise tax 9 received by the state from any such railroad during the 10 year nineteen hundred and twenty-one in excess of four 11 percent of the gross transportation receipts of such rail-12 road during the year nineteen hundred and twenty shall be 13 paid by the state to the treasurer of such railroad for the 14 use of such railroad, said payment to be made on or before 15 the first day of October, nineteen hundred and twenty-one; 16 so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

'Sect. 27. The amount of such annual excise tax shall be 2 ascertained as follows: The amount of the gross transpor-3 tation receipts as returned to the public utilities commis-4 sion for the year ending on the thirty-first day of Decem-5 ber preceding the levying of such tax, shall be divided by 6 the number of miles of railroad operated, to ascertain the 7 average gross receipts per mile; when such average re-8 ceipts per mile do not exceed fifteen hundred dollars, the 9 tax shall be equal to one-half of one per cent of the gross 10 transportation receipts; when the average receipts per mile II exceed fifteen hundred dollars and do not exceed nineteen 12 hundred dollars, the tax shall be equal to three-quarters of 13 one per cent of the gross receipts, and so on increasing the 14 rate of tax one-quarter of one per cent for each additional 15 four hundred dollars of average gross receipts per mile or 16 fractional part thereof; provided, that the rate in no event 17 exceed five and one-half per cent, and in case the railroads 18 operated exclusively for the transportation of freight said

19 rate shall in no event exceed three per cent. When a rail-20 road lies partly within and partly without the state, or is 21 operated as a part of a line or system extending beyond the 22 state, the tax shall be equal to the same proportion of the 23 gross receipts in the state, as herein provided, and its amount 24 shall be determined as follows: The gross transportation 25 receipts of such railroad, line or system, as the case may 26 be, over its whole extent, within or without the state, shall 27 be divided by the total number of miles operated to obtain 28 the average gross receipts per mile, and the gross receipts 29 in the state shall be taken to be the average gross receipts 30 per mile, multiplied by the number of miles operated within 31 the state. Provided, however, that during the years nine-32 teen hundred and twenty-two and nineteen hundred and 33 twenty-three the rate shall not exceed four per cent of such 34 gross transportation receipts; and provided also that any 35 such annual excise.tax received by the state from any such 36 railroad during the year nineteen hundred and twenty-one 37 in excess of four per cent of the gross transportation re-38 ceipts of such railroad during the year nineteen hundred and 39 twenty shall be paid by the state to the treasurer of such 40 railroad for the use of such railroad, said payment to be 41 made on or before the first day of October, nineteen hundred 42 and twenty-one.'
