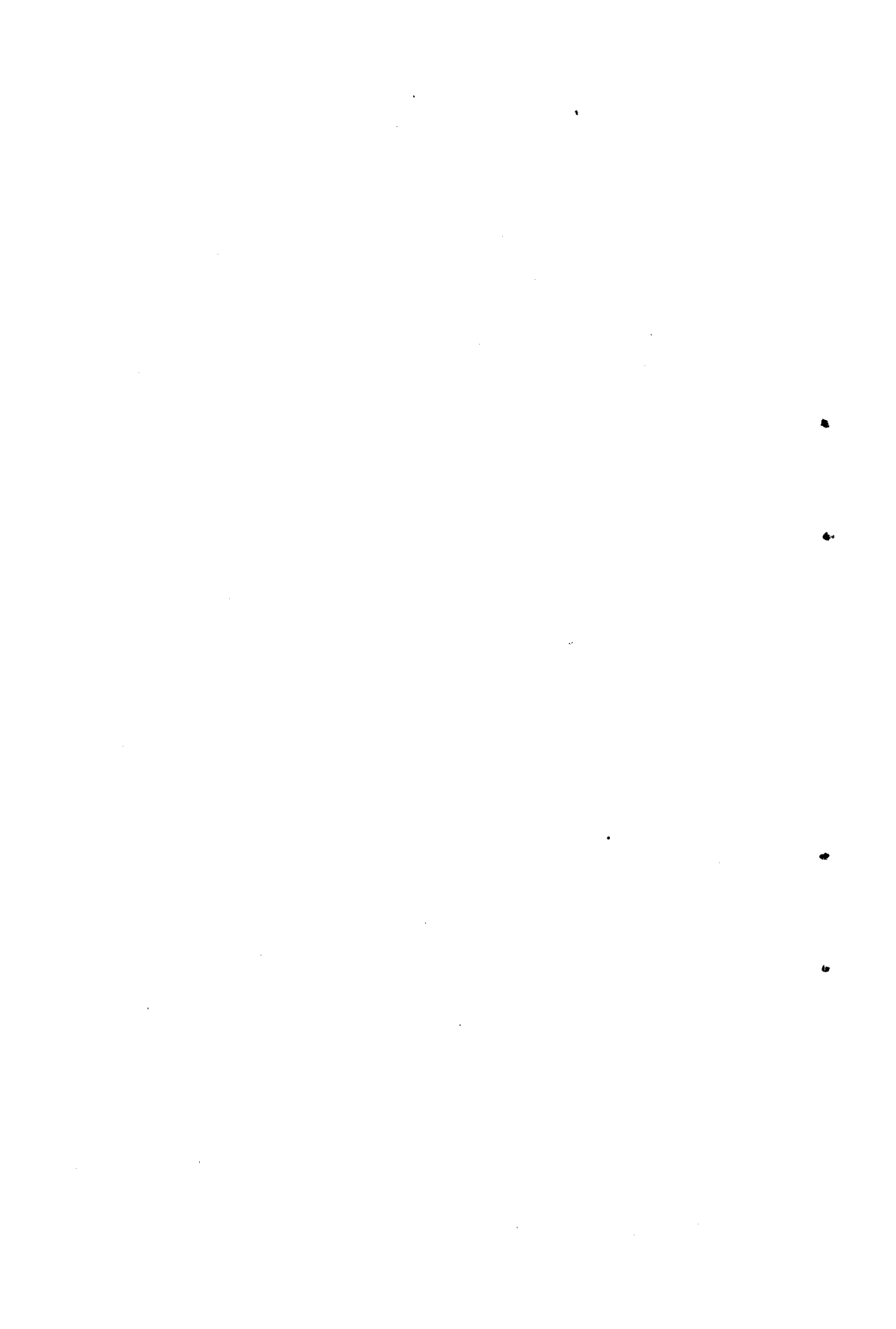

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives of the Eightieth Legislature:

Herewith is submitted the biennial report of the State Auditor covering the financial operations of the State for the past two years.

I wish to take this opportunity to call attention to some defects and suggested changes in the laws governing State finances.

I recommend that an act be passed requiring that in case public acts or the revised statutes prescribe a method of procedure or direct an expenditure, that such acts take precedence of private and special acts, so that in case of direct conflict the public act shall prevail. For example: Section 1, Chapter 7, R. S., provides that the printing of ballots for municipal elections shall be paid for by such cities or towns. However, a private and special act passed in 1917 provided that a local election in a city of this State be decided by ballots furnished and paid for by the State and the State was compelled to pay.

There should be an act authorizing clerk hire for the Attorney General and for the Commissioners of Sea and Shore Fisheries. Such authority has never been granted by statute for these two departments.

I also recommend the enactment of a statute defining a State officer as distinguished from a State employee. It is believed that the Deputy Attorney General, the Deputy Secretary of State, the Deputy Insurance Commissioner, the Superintendent of Public Printing, the State Pension Agent and the Chief Clerk in the Office of the Adjutant General are public officers, as they are commissioned and sworn to the duties of their respective offices. On the other hand, the following appear to be clerks or employees, no commission having been issued to them and no oath of office being required from them: Deputy State Superintendent of Public Schools, Deputy Bank Commissioner, Deputy Treasurer of State, Private Secretary to the Governor, Messenger to the Governor and Council, Assistant Librarian and the chief clerks in the offices of the Board of State Assessors, State Auditor and Industrial Accident Commission. The importance of such an enactment is obvious when considered in the light of Chapter 38, of the Public Laws of 1919, providing for the retirement at half pay of State employees who have

served twenty-five consecutive years. It is practically certain that the question of who are State officers and who State employees will come up for a decision within the next two years, which makes it important that legislation should now be enacted on this matter.

Chapter 197, Public Laws of 1917, prescribes the duties and fixes the salary of the Commissioner of Public Health and further provides that he shall devote his entire time to his official duties. Section 26, Chapter 19, R. S., provides that said Commissioner of Health shall be a member, ex-officio, of the Board of Embalming Examiners, and as such is authorized by Section 51, Chapter 117, R. S., to receive the sum of \$10.00 a day while actually employed in the performance of these duties. These acts are in conflict, as an annual salary for the entire time of an officer cannot be supplemented by a per diem of \$10.00 for certain days of that year from another State source. I have declined to certify for payment certain per diem charges of the State Commissioner of Health when he was employed as an embalming examiner. I recommend that if the Commissioner of Health be continued as a member of the Board of Embalming Examiners that it be without pay, and that Section 51, Chapter 117, R. S., be amended accordingly.

I wish to renew the recommendation of two years ago relative to a general statute providing that on all State construction the appropriation shall remain available for expenditure until the work is completed, or until all contracts are cancelled in case the appropriation is not used.

The plan of carrying into one account the traveling expenses of all officials, and paying same from an appropriation listed separately under the head of each department and known as general office expenses, has worked satisfactorily so far as it was possible to bring the various departments under this system, which was first attempted two years ago. It is recommended that the same classification be extended to the Adjutant General's Department. In that Department the traveling expenses of the Adjutant General and those of his immediate office force who are required to travel should be paid from the appropriation for general office expenses and not from the military fund, as at present. The appropriation for clerk hire should include all clerk hire paid out in this Department. The present appropriation for salaries and clerk hire includes only the salary of the Adjutant General and the Chief Clerk. In 1919 there was paid from the military fund for clerk hire and for labor in the military storehouses \$18,219.85 and in 1920 there was paid from that fund for the same purpose \$15,137.96.

A serious omission in our session laws and one that causes wonder and inquiry, especially among those in other states, is that they nowhere show when the acts and resolves therein contained become effective. A statute should require the Secretary of State to place upon the title page the date on which the laws become effective. Emergency acts and resolves would, of course, be shown to be effective on the date of their approval, which date in all cases appears at the end of the chapter. This requirement should also be made to apply to the published acts required to be printed in the newspapers of the State, under Section 54, Chapter 2, R. S.

I believe that this section should be amended in an important particular. Its requirement is that the Secretary of State "shall cause the public laws passed at each session to be printed within thirty days after the close thereof . . ." This requirement was literally followed after the special session of Nov. 4-8, 1919, and an expense of \$5,244.80 was incurred in printing and distributing the few acts passed at that time. The expense of publishing and distributing the 239 public acts passed at the regular session was \$5,743.58. I suggest that the word "regular" be inserted between the words "each" and "session." The law might well be further amended by authorizing the Secretary to use his discretion as to publication and distribution of public acts passed at a special session. There is no sufficient reason for advertising five or six acts passed at a special session at an expense of over \$5,000.00. In 1912 Governor Plaisted directed that the two public acts passed at the special session of that year be not advertised in the usual way and they were later embodied in the public laws of 1913, (page 991). He did not strictly comply with the law, but effected a saving of several thousand dollars.

I also believe that the law should be changed that requires two sets of ballots to be printed and distributed. The extra set is sent a few days after the first one, so that in case the first one is lost the town will still have sufficient ballots. To show that this seems to be unnecessary I need only cite the fact that the law providing for primary elections makes no such provision and I have heard of no shortage of ballots on account of one set only being printed and distributed. The express bill alone on the extra set is sometimes in excess of \$700.00 and the printing and expressage on the extra set at the September election in 1918 was \$1,626.60.

I can see no good reason why this State should have towns and plantations of the same name, thus: town of Lincoln and Lincoln planta-

tion; town of Webster and Webster plantation; town of Rangeley and Rangeley plantation. To complete this confusion of names we have two Number 21 plantations, one in Washington and one in Hancock county. There is a town of Woodland in Aroostook county and a post-office of that name in Washington county. This similarity in names causes much confusion in the various departments and occasionally results in paying money to the wrong town or plantation.

The fees of the various examining boards are now carrying accounts, except those of the Board of Osteopathy. I recommend that the fees of this board be treated in the same manner as the others and that Section 52, Chapter 117, R. S., be amended accordingly.

Section 82, Chapter 2, R. S., provides that the State Auditor shall not certify claims in excess of the appropriation therefor. Chapter 172, P. L. 1919, modifies this law by providing that bills for the board and care of neglected children when approved by the State Board of Charities and Corrections "and audited by the State Auditor, shall be paid by the Treasurer of State, who shall recover from the town of settlement, if any, of any such child, one-half, but not exceeding an average of two dollars per week, of any such payments on account of said child." As the intent of this act is evidently to authorize the Auditor to pay bills in excess of the appropriation, and as this is prohibited by the first act cited, I have followed what seemed to me the safe course of declining to pay any accounts in excess of the appropriation made by the Legislature until a sufficient sum was transferred from the State Contingent Fund with which to pay bills in excess of the appropriation.

I believe that the appropriate Committee of the Legislature should consider whether the boundaries of one town at least should in the interest of equalizing taxes and simplifying the work in some of the departments, be changed; and also that a discussion of the question of whether some of the islands off our shores should be included in the adjoining towns on the mainland, might be in the interests of efficiency and modern methods. Hibbert's Gore is a triangular tract of land containing 690 acres of land and lying where the counties of Lincoln, Waldo and Knox corner. It is not included in any town and the farms there escaped taxation entirely until a few years ago. It is now taxed separately by the State Assessors. Geographically it appears to belong to the town of Somerville, which would place it in Lincoln county. The largest farm there contains 188 acres, valued at \$940.00. As a State tax of seven and a quarter mills only is assessed against this and other farms in the gore and as the adjoining farms in Somerville pay

a tax of thirty-five mills on the dollar a great disparity in taxation is produced. The total tax on the largest farm there would be about \$8.00, while in the adjoining town of Somerville it would be \$32.90. The same or similar conditions exist in the case of Muscongus Island, containing 916 acres, and geographically belonging to the town of Bristol, and to Marshall and Eagle Islands and other small islands in the east part of Penobscot Bay, with an area of 2,450 acres. So far as known these are the only islands on our coast that are not by law included within some town or civil division of the State, and being in the peculiar relation of being a part of the territory of the United States, as they are within the three-mile limit, but not being considered as belonging to the State of Maine. Though in recent years, acting upon their own initiative and without any express statute authority, a State tax was assessed against them, the Legislature taking no action to include them within any town. It is true that if so included the amount of additional taxes would be negligible, but considerable expense and a great deal of bookkeeping would be eliminated. The description of these lands requires twelve pages in the report of the State Assessors. The tax on many of the sub-divisions amounts to only a few cents a year. For instance the annual State tax on one of the cottage lots on Muscongus Island, valued at \$50.00, is only three and six-tenths cents. The postage required to collect the tax, frequently exceeds the amount of the tax. Still these taxes all have to be collected and all this small detail followed out in the office of the Treasurer of State, to be in turn posted upon the books of the State Auditor.

I wish to again refer, as I did in 1919, to the considerable number of acts providing that fees collected by the various departments shall be added to the appropriations for those departments. During the sessions of 1917 and 1919 a large number of such laws were enacted. In the past there have been times when there appeared to be a determination to abandon this vicious custom, but the various departments bring such pressure upon the Legislature, emphasizing that if certain extensions of their work are allowed that "it will not cost the State anything," that such acts continually find their way into the session laws. We submit that it is not good business to allow a department to use its fees. Perhaps the most notable instance where this is being done is in the Department of Inland Fisheries and Game, which now, by the enactment of various acts and resolves is authorized to add to its own appropriations all fines and licenses in excess of \$50,000.00, to be used for the salaries and expenses of fish and game wardens, office

expenses and for the maintenance of the several fish hatcheries; also authority to use all the non-resident fishermen's licenses and the resident hunters' licenses. In addition to general authority to expend these licenses a resolve of 1919 (Chapter 34) makes all these fees continuing accounts for the years 1919, 1920 and 1921, so that amounts unexpended in any of these years may be carried forward until they can be expended in a succeeding year. These matters not only complicate the bookkeeping in at least three of the State departments, but they cause dissatisfaction in other departments, which realize that they are not receiving equal privileges under the law. The following are other examples: Chapter 188, Section 9, P. L. 1917, adding certain amounts to the appropriation for superintendence of towns comprising school unions, such amounts to be used for defraying traveling expenses of agents. Chapter 178, P. L. 1917, relative to expenses charged to towns for destroying trees and plants infested with the white pine blister rust, such fees and costs to be credited to the appropriation for that purpose. Chapter 137, P. L. 1917, authorizing the State Superintendent of Public Schools to collect registration fees of teachers and use such fees for certain purposes. Chapter 214, P. L. 1917, providing that the Commissioner of Agriculture may collect license fees from nurserymen and add such fees to the appropriation for the bureau of horticulture, to be used exclusively for the inspection of nursery stock. Chapter 298, P. L. 1917, as amended by Chapter 163, P. L. 1919, provides that fees paid in by small loan agencies shall be used to pay the salary and traveling expenses of an examiner to be appointed by the Bank Commissioner. To show that this practice will probably continue I need only cite the fact that House Document No. 9, presented January 11, 1921, provides "that all money collected for license fees under the provisions of this act shall be deposited to the credit of the Commissioner of Agriculture, . . . and shall be paid by him to the Treasurer of State and the same is hereby appropriated to be expended in the enforcement of the provisions of this chapter."

The act providing for a State Contingent Fund, Chapter 317, P. L. 1915, now included in Chapter 2, R. S., authorized the transfer of all unexpended balances of appropriations to that account, unless continued by law, and authorizes payments from said fund of "outstanding bills or accounts that were properly chargeable to the several appropriations previous to the first day of January of each year;" also that it may be used "to pay outstanding bills necessarily contracted by State departments or State institutions for which the Legislature failed to

make sufficient provision, and to pay such other expenses as may be necessarily incurred under any requirement of law, or for the maintenance of government and which the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Council, shall authorize; provided, however, that no payment shall be made from this fund, except as above provided, unless some emergency shall arise requiring an expenditure of money not provided for by the Legislature."

This law I believe to be open to criticism in two important respects:

1. The clause "no payment shall be made from this fund . . . unless some emergency shall arise requiring an expenditure of money not provided for by the Legislature," is indefinite and open to many constructions. Two years ago the Hospital Trustees requested from the Legislature authority to erect a nurses' home, (Senate Document No. 174, 79th Legislature). This the Legislature refused to grant, but believing that a dormitory was needed there more than a nurses' home, passed a resolve, (Chapter 144), granting \$50,000.00 each year for a "building to accommodate one hundred patients." In spite of this resolve the trustees on or about Aug. 12, 1919, proceeded to have erected a nurses' home and incurred an expense of \$3,919.71 for plans for same. My attention was not called to this matter until bills for advertising for bids, Oct. 8, to construct a nurses' home came to my office. These I refused to certify for payment. Soon afterward the bill of the architect was presented and payment likewise refused. The trustees then changed their plans and began the construction of a dormitory, as authorized by the Legislature. After bids were advertised and contract let it was discovered that \$100,000 was insufficient to construct the building and the Governor and Council on July 21, 1920, declaring an emergency, ordered that \$65,000.00 be transferred from the State Contingent Fund to this account. What it was not even planned to build in November, 1919, became the emergency of July, 1920. I believe that what was here declared to be an emergency was merely the desire to build a certain type of building that would cost more than the amount authorized by the Legislature. The courts have held that any matter the Legislature declares to be an emergency thereby becomes an emergency, the Legislature being supreme in such matters. I believe that in the matter of appropriations the Governor and Council are subordinate to the Legislature and that there is a grave doubt of the constitutionality of any act that authorizes the Governor and Council to declare an emergency and expend money not authorized by the Legislature.

2. Departments and institutions have come to realize that appropriation acts are not final and that if they desire to expend more than the Legislature has appropriated the Governor and Council will allow any further sum required from the State Contingent Fund. Chapter 120, of the Resolves of 1919, provided for a building for the Adjutant General's Department and appropriated \$25,000.00 for such purpose; provided, however, "that no expenditure be made or contracts therefor, until there has been first obtained from responsible parties a contract, the performance of which shall be secured by a satisfactory bond to complete the work for a sum not exceeding the amount specified in this resolve." The contract for the building called for \$23,235.00, for the wiring \$800.00, for the heating \$3,044.00 and for extras \$2,888.55. Although the Legislature made an attempt to fix the total to be paid out on this account, there was nevertheless transferred from the Contingent Fund the sum of \$5,026.75, to complete this building, all of which was expended except \$29.60. The Attorney General in 1918 ruled that a resolve can amend a public act. If so, this resolve certainly amended the law relative to the State Contingent Fund, having passed subsequently to that act. The plain terms of this resolve were disregarded by the Governor and Council, who, if they were unable to obtain from any party a contract secured by a satisfactory bond to complete this work for a sum not exceeding the appropriation, should have refused to let the contract and have reported their action to this Legislature.

For the State Park Commission a transfer was made from the State Contingent Fund, adding \$2,000.00 to an appropriation of like amount. A part of this money from the Contingent Fund was used to pay for plans and services of an architect to influence the Budget Committee to recommend and the Legislature to appropriate a larger amount for the next two and a half years.

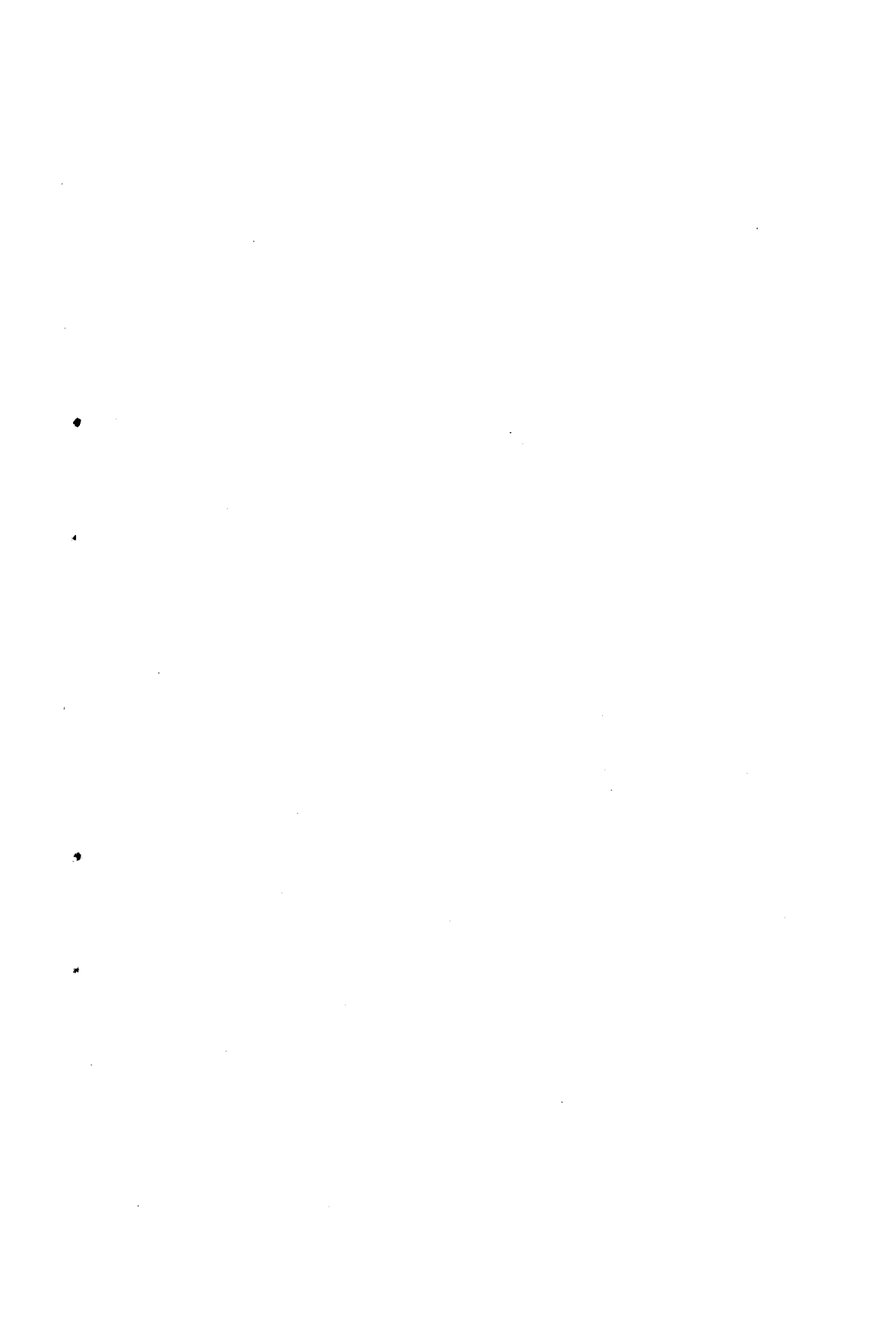

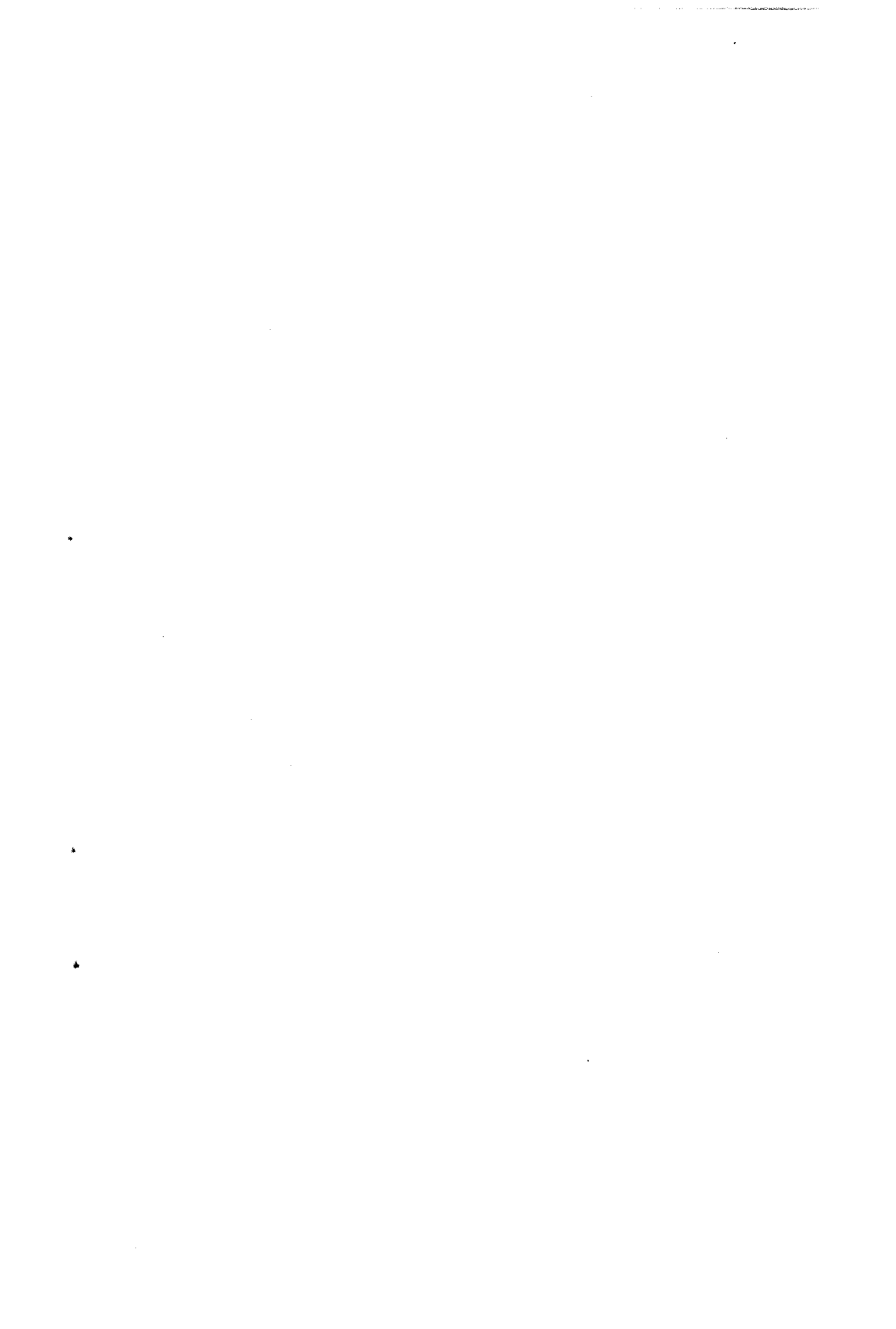
