STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-THREE

AN ACT to Amend Section One Hundred Sixteen of Chapter Four of the Revised Statutes, Pertaining to the Right to Kill Dogs.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section one hundred and sixteen of chapter four is hereby

- 2 amended by striking out the entire section and inserting in
- 3 place thereof the following:

'Sect. 116. When dogs may be lawfully killed. Any

- 2 game warden, sheriff, deputy sheriff or constable may at
- 3 any time lawfully kill any dog he may find in the act of
- 4 hunting or chasing moose, caribou or dear, or he may find
- 5 worrying, wounding or killing any domestic animal, when

6 said dog is outside of the enclosure or immediate care of its 7 owner or keeper. Any person having any evidence of any 8 dog hunting or chasing moose, caribou or deer, or of any 9 dog kept and used for that purpose, or of any dog worry-10 ing, wounding or killing any domestic animal, when said 11 dog is outside of the enclosure or immediate care of his 12 owner or keeper, may present said evidence to any trial 13 justice or judge or recorder of any municipal court, which 14 said trial justice, judge or recorder shall have power to 15 issue a warrant against the owner of said dog, ordering 16 him to appear before him and show cause why said dog 17 should not be killed; and upon hearing the evidence in said 18 case said court may order said dog killed. Any person 19 may lawfully kill a dog which suddenly assaults him or 20 another person when peaceably walking or riding.'
