AN ACT to Regulate the Taking of Clams.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

- Whenever any warden, or other officer shall have
- 9 reason to believe that this act has been violated with refer-
- 10 ence to the culling of clams, such warden or other officer

shall with or without a warrant examine the cargo of any 12 boat or vessel, enter any building or factory, market, 13 peddler's vehicle, or any receptacle or place where they have 14 reason to believe that clams of less than legal length may be 15 found. If upon examination the said warden or other officer 16 shall find that five per cent or more in number of clams 17 found shall consist of clams that measure less than two and 18 one-half inches measuring the long diameter, of the shell, 19 the captain of the vessel or boat, or the person in charge of 20 the said vessel or boat, the owner or lessee of factory, 21 building, vehicle or receptacle in which such clams of less 22 than two and one-half inches in length measured the long 23 diameter of the shell are found, shall be deemed to have 24 violated this act, and upon conviction shall be fined not less 25 than twenty-five or more than two hundred dollars, or 26 confined in jail for not less than thirty days nor more than 27 six months, either or both. Clams taken under a violation 28 of this act shall be confiscated and all clams so taken that 29 measure less than two and one-half inches measuring the 30 long diameter of the shell shall be at once returned to the 31 nearest natural bed or clam bottom, below the half tide 32 mark. The vessel or boat on which said clams are found 33 shall be held as security for the payment of said fine.
