**AN ACT Establishing a Game Sanctuary in the City of Bangor  
and County of Penobscot.**

---

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

No person shall, except as herein provided, at any time,  
2 hunt, pursue, shoot at or kill any wild animal or any game  
3 or wild bird within the following described territory situ-  
4 ated in the city of Bangor in the county of Penobscot:  
5 Bounded on the south by the southerly line of said city of  
6 Bangor; on the east by the Penobscot river and Kendus-  
7 keag stream; on the north by Hammond Street, so-called,  
8 in said city of Bangor; and on the west by the westerly  
9 boundary line of said city. Provided, however, that the

10 provisions of this section shall not be construed to prohibit  
11 the trapping of wild animals within the above described  
12 territory in accordance with the general laws of the state.  
13 Whoever violates any provision of this section shall be sub-  
14 ject to a penalty of not less than ten nor more than three  
15 hundred dollars and costs for each offense or imprisonment  
16 for sixty days or both said fine and imprisonment.

It shall also be unlawful, under the same penalty, for any  
2 person to have in possession at any time any wild animal  
3 or any wild bird, or part thereof, taken within the above  
4 named closed territory.
