STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE
HUNDRED AND TWENTY-FIVE

AN ACT Relating to Admission to the Bar.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 29 of Chapter 84 of the Revised Statutes of the
2 State of Maine is hereby amended by inserting after the
3 words "United States" in the third line thereof the words
4 'and the Constitution of the State of Maine,' so that said
5 section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 29. Attorney's oath. R. S. c. 81, Sec. 30. Upon
2 admission to the bar, every applicant shall, in open court,
3 take and subscribe an oath to support the constitution of
4 the United States and the constitution of the State of Maine,
5 and also take the following oath:

“You solemnly swear, that you will do no falsehood, nor consent to the doing of any in court, and that if you know of an intention to commit any, you will give knowledge thereof to the justices of the court or some of them, that it may be prevented; you will not wittingly or willingly, promote or sue any false, groundless or unlawful suit, nor give aid or consent to the same; that you will delay no man for lucre or malice, but will conduct yourself in the office of an attorney within the courts, according to the best of your knowledge and discretion, and with all good fidelity, as well to the courts, as to your clients. So help you God.”
