STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE
HUNDRED AND TWENTY-FIVE

AN ACT in Relation to Special Allowances of Officers in the
National Guard.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section forty-eight of chapter one hundred and seventy-
2 four of the public laws of nineteen hundred and twenty-
3 three is hereby amended by striking out in the tenth, eleventh
4 and twelfth lines of said section the words "including such
5 incidental expenditures as are allowed by law and regula-
6 tions to officers of the regular army when inspecting the
7 organized militia," so that, as amended, said section shall
8 read as follows:

'Sect. 48. In addition to all other pay and allowances

2 herein provided there shall be allowed each company com-
3 mander or other officer who in the opinion of the adjutant
4 general is entitled to remuneration for care and responsi-
5 bility of military property and satisfactory performance of
6 military duties, not exceeding fifty dollars per annum; each
7 company clerk, and each company supply sergeant, not ex-
8 ceeding twenty-five dollars per annum, when certified by
9 the company commander.

‘To all officers ordered to make inspection or other jour-
2 neys necessary in the military service, there shall be allowed
3 all actual and necessary expenses incident to the perform-
4 ance of said service.

‘Whenever deemed necessary, the adjutant general may
2 authorize the commutation of rations for enlisted men, which
3 shall be at the rate fixed by the regulations of the United
4 States army in force at the time.

‘The adjutant general whenever necessary, and in such
2 manner as he may deem, shall provide suitable mounts for
3 all officers and enlisted men required to perform mounted
4 duty. He shall also approve all other just and reasonable
5 claims, payments and expenditures, legally made in behalf
6 of the military service of the state.’
