#### STATE OF MAINE

## IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-FIVE

RESOLVE, Providing for a State Pension for Alice Guptill, of Belfast.

Resolved: That a pension of twelve dollars per month be, 2 and hereby is, granted to Alice Guptill, of Belfast, to be 3 paid quarterly from the fund appropriated for soldiers' pen-4 sions. Said pension shall begin January first, nineteen hun-5 dred and twenty-five, and continue until otherwise provided 6 by the legislature.

#### STATEMENT OF FACTS

Alice Guptill is the daughter of Dexter T. Guptill, a Civil War veteran. Her mother, who received a government pension and a state pension, died recently. Her father died in 1913. Miss Guptill is very ill and under the care of a physician. She has two sisters living with her on the old homestead. One sister has never been able to do anything to earn a livelihood; the other sister, who was employed as a stenographer, has been obliged to give up her position to take care of the other two. The home is of little value and these three sisters are without means of support.
