STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-FIVE

AN ACT to Amend Section Twenty-six of Chapter Fourteen of the Revised Statutes, Relating to Schools on Indian Island in Old Town.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section twenty-six of chapter fourteen of the revised stat-

- 2 utes is hereby amended by striking out all of said section
- 3 and substituting therefor the following, so that said sec-
- 4 tion, when amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 26. School moneys of tribe, how expended. The

- 2 expenditure of all money appropriated for schools, the man-
- 3 agement of said schools, and the custody and care, includ-
- 4 ing repairs and insurance on school buildings and other

5 school property upon island number one, commonly called 6 Indian Old Town island of Penobscot tribe of Indians, shall 7 devolve upon the superintending school committee of the 8 city of Old Town subject to the approval of the governor o and council; and those within the territorial limits of any 10 other town shall devolve upon the superintending school 11 committee of such town. Said superintending school com-12 mittee shall employ the teachers, fix their salaries, and se-13 lect and purchase the text-books, limited by such appro-14 priations, regulate the grades and courses of study in strict 15 conformity with those of the public schools, visit said 16 schools, and determine when any scholar of said tribe may 17 properly be admitted or transferred to the public schools 18 of said city or town; and make report to the agent of said 19 tribe at least once a year, noting therein such facts and 20 information as may seem of importance to the interest of 21 education among said tribe, or as may be required by the 22 governor and council, or the commissioner of education. 23 The agent may pay said superintending school committee 24 from said school appropriation a reasonable compensation 25 for services; but the compensation of the superintendent 26 of schools for the city of Old Town for his services shall 27 be not less than fifty dollars per year.'
