STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE
HUNDRED AND TWENTY-FIVE

AN ACT Increasing the Salary of the Postmaster of the
Senate.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section thirteen of chapter one hundred seventeen of the
2 revised statutes as amended by chapter one hundred seven
3 of the public laws of nineteen hundred twenty-one is hereby
4 further amended by inserting after the word "messenger"
5 in the twentieth line the words 'and postmaster,' and by
6 striking out the word "postmaster" in the twenty-first line;
7 by inserting the word 'each' after the word "shall" in the
8 twentieth line, so that said section, as amended, shall read
9 as follows:

'Sect. 13. The secretary of the senate shall perform the usual duties of the office during the session of the legislature, file and index all papers, which have been subject to adverse legislative action, index and supervise the publication of the senate journal, and in addition thereto devote the month of December of the year following the legislative session to the work of making preparation for the incoming legislature. He shall also perform the duties required of him by sections thirty and thirty-three of chapter two. He shall also deliver to the librarian of the Maine State Library all papers on file in the office of the secretary of the senate which were considered by a session of the legislature held more than ten years previously and the state librarian shall inspect said papers and preserve all those having any historical or permanent value. He shall receive a salary of fifteen hundred dollars in full for all official services by him performed during the term for which he is chosen, as follows: Eleven hundred dollars at the end of the session of the legislature, three hundred dollars when the journal of the senate is completed, and one hundred dollars when the index of papers is completed.

'The assistant secretary of the senate shall receive a salary of six hundred dollars; his work to be performed under the direction of the secretary.

'The messenger and postmaster of the senate shall each receive a salary of four hundred dollars; the assistant messenger, folder, assistant folder, and doorkeeper shall each

4 receive a salary of three hundred dollars; the pages shall
5 each receive a salary of one hundred fifty dollars; the offi-
6 cial reporter shall receive a salary of one thousand dollars.

‘All of the above officers shall work under the direction
2 of the president of the senate. The above salaries shall be
3 in full for all official services by them performed during the
4 term for which they are chosen, and no other compensation
5 shall be allowed them, except in case of an adjourned or
6 special session of the legislature. The increase herein pro-
7 vided for shall apply to the postmaster of this, the eighty-
8 second legislature.’
