STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE
HUNDRED AND TWENTY-SEVEN

AN ACT Increasing the Fees for Permits for Opening Paved
Public Highways.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

That section one hundred and nineteen of chapter twenty-
2 four of the revised statutes be amended by striking out all
3 of the first sentence in said paragraph after the word "stone"
4 in the sixth line of said paragraph and inserting in place
5 of the part stricken out the following: 'concrete, bitulithic,
6 granite block, brick, wood block, sheet asphalt or other pave-
7 ments, the following fees. For sheet asphalt, wood block,
8 brick and granite block, all on concrete base, six dollars
9 per square yard; for granite block on gravel base, bitulithic
10 and concrete, three dollars and fifty cents per square yard;

11 and for broken stone and all other pavements, two dollars
12 and fifty cents per square yard,' so that said section, as
13 amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 119. The commissioner of public works or such
2 officer as the city government may appoint, shall keep a
3 record of all permits granted by him, and before any per-
4 mit is granted (work done by the city employees excepted)
5 the applicant shall pay to the city treasurer for every per-
6 mit for making an excavation within the driveways of any
7 public highway paved with broken stone, concrete, bitu-
8 lithic, granite block, brick, wood block, sheet asphalt or
9 other pavements, the following fees: for sheet asphalt, wood
10 block, brick, and granite block, all on concrete base, six
11 dollars per square yard; for granite block on gravel base,
12 bitulithic and concrete, three dollars and fifty cents per
13 square yard; and for broken stone and all other pavements,
14 two dollars and fifty cents per square yard. All such fees
15 paid to the city treasurer shall be regularly accounted for
16 by him in his report to the city council, and shall constitute
17 a special fund for the repaving of said cuts; when such
18 cuts are repaired by the street department, the cost thereof
19 shall be charged to said fund.'
