# STATE OF MAINE

## IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-SEVEN

- AN ACT Relating to the Tenure of Office of the Chief Engineer and Members of the Fire Department in the City of Biddeford.
- Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows: Section 1. The chief engineer and any member of the fire
  2 department in the city of Biddeford hereafter appointed or
  3 elected, shall hold office continuously during good behavior
  4 unless incapacitated through physical or mental disability
  5 from performing the duties of his position; provided, how6 ever, that the mayor of the city with the consent of the con7 firming power, may remove the chief engineer or any mem8 ber of the fire department for just cause and for reasons

9 specifically given by the officer or board ordering the re-10 moval.

Sect. 2. The person sought to be removed shall have 2 notice and shall be furnished with a copy of the reasons 3 required to be given in section one and shall be allowed a 4 reasonable time to answer the same in writing. A copy of 5 such reasons, notice and answer and of the order of removal 6 shall be made a matter of public record of the fire depart-7 ment.

Sect. 3. This act shall not be effective until the same has 2 been approved by a majority vote of the inhabitants in said 3 city, qualified to vote in municipal affairs, at any municipal 4 election held before December thirty-first, nineteen hundred 5 and twenty-eight. The city clerk shall reduce the subject 6 matter to the following question: "Shall the city accept the 7 provisions of the act relating to the tenure of the office of the 8 chief engineer and members of the fire department," and the 9 voters shall indicate by a cross placed within a square upon 10 their ballots, opposite the words "Yes" or "No," their opin-11 ion of the same.
