STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-SEVEN

RESOLVE, in Favor of Arthur L. Thayer, of Bangor, for Use of His Private Car While Chairman of the Maine Industrial Accident Commission.

Resolved: That there be paid to Arthur L. Thayer, of 2 Bangor, Maine, former chairman of the Maine Industrial 3 Accident Commission, the sum of three hundred seventy 4 and 76/100 dollars to reimburse him for the use of his 5 private car in work connected with the Industrial Accident 6 Commission during the months of April, May and June 7 of the year nineteen hundred and twenty-four. In April, May and June, 1924, I used my own automobile to carry the members of the Industrial Accident Commission about the state for the purpose of holding the hearings required by the provisions of the Workmen's Compensation Act. As the trips were made an itemized statement was furnished bimonthly to the State Auditor as required by law. The statements included all expenses of travel incident to the work of the commission including hotel bills, meals, telephone charges and railroad or auto hire.

From April 17, 1924 to June 18, 1924, both dates inclusive, the transportation of the entire commission was provided by me by the use of my own automobile. A charge of ten cents per mile was made by me for the use of the automobile, which charge the State Auditor did not then allow. The items for the use of the automobile presented in regular form but not allowed are as follows:

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On all of the above scheduled trips there were present at least three members of the Industrial Accident Commission, usually four and often five. Besides the members of the commission we often took with us members or officials of other departments making no charge to either the members thus carried or to the department which was represented by them.

By the use of the machine a direct saving of several hundred dollars was effected. In addition to the direct financial saving by the use of the machine the members of the Commission could cover a much larger area in a given time and thereby perform the work required much more efficiently and with much greater satisfaction to all concerned.

This resolve is a repetition in part of a similar one which passed both branches of the legislature at the last session and which was presented to the Governor in common with several others in the now famous "blanket resolve" which the Governor has recently returned to this legislature with his veto attached. Since 1925 I have received the amount asked for for the use of the machine during the months of July to December, inclusive, for 1924, leaving only the months of April to June inclusive for which I still ask pay.

On June 30th, 1924, there lapsed into the State contingent fund from the unexpended appropriation of the Industrial Accident Commission nearly \$1000.00. The saving of this sum was due in a large part to the use of the machine in travel by the Commission.
